Bumper '58 Crop Forecast by OSC Wheat Economist

Bumper wheat crops across the U.S. and prices at least 20 cents a bushel under last year at harvest time appear in the making this summer, reports an Oregon State college agricultural economist.

M. D. Thomas says latest USDA crop estimates point to more than in 1957 and 14 percent above the average for the past 10 years.

Thomas adds that odds are that supports on the bumper wheat crop will drop to 75 percent of parity or about \$1.82 per bushel for the national average.

At the same time D. D. Hill, OSC farm crops department head, announced that Itana, a new hard red winter bread-type wheat released for some areas of the northwest, will not be recommended for Oregon.

Itana is similar to Columbia wheat released three years ago in Oregon as a hard red winter variety for low rainfall areas. Columbia is more smut resistant and higher yielding than Itana under Oregon growing conditions, Hill stated. Because of Columbia's excellent performance in Oregon's low-rainfall areas, Hill said, there is no point in releasing Itana in Oregon.

Washington State college this week released Itana for areas of less than 10 inches rainfall in Washington, Idaho and Montana released the new wheat in 1956.

PETE'S T.V. TIPS

You may have noticed this sign above supermarket tube testers: "Getting stuck with high priced T.V. repair bills? Test tubes here yourself and save." Such a sign would have you believe all T.V. troubles are caused by tubes, and that all a serviceman does is haul tubes out to you for an outrageous fee. Obviously, such is not the case.

What does the supermarket tube tester offer to the customer that he cannot get from his serviceman? Is it free testing service? No, any serviceman will gladly do the same if you bring your tubes to him.

Are supermarket tube testers superior to those found in a service shop? No. In fact, they are decidedly inferior. Their simple good-bad test is not adequate to check all functions of a T.V. tube. Naturally, an inexpensive tube tester like this one cannot be expected to outperform the precision instruments found in service shops.

Now someone will accuse the serviceman of objecting to the supermarket tube tester because it hurts his business. To this I plead guilty. A serviceman, as the name implies, is one who sells service. But he cannot pay for his running expenses by service alone. The profit he makes from tube sales helps to defray these costs. You can buy your tubes from your serviceman for the same price asked at a supermarket, and at the same time you are helping your serviceman stay in business to serve you.
