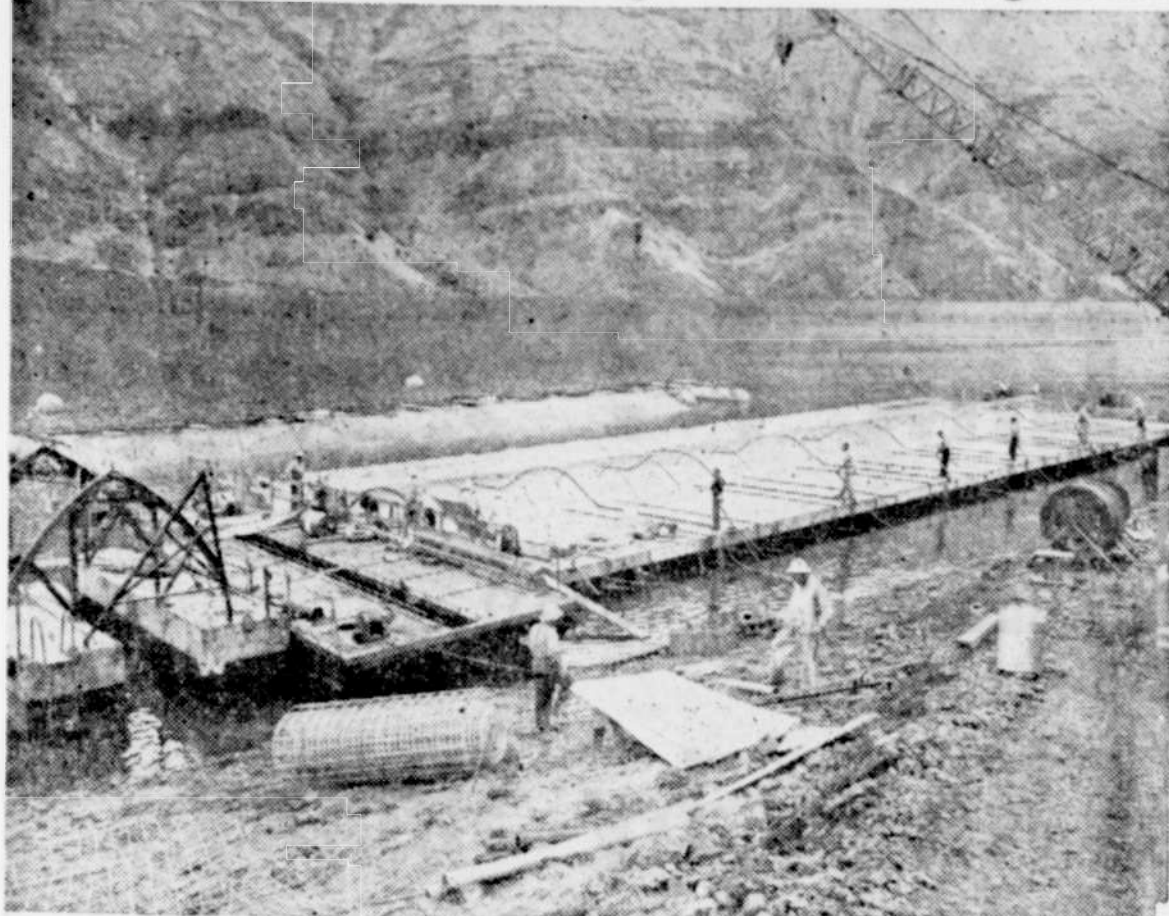


Brownlee Downstream Barge Aids Fish Migration



KNIT ONE, PURL TWO. It's on this specially built barge, 152 feet long and 48 feet wide, that workmen now are skillfully weaving that giant net for Brownlee dam's unique downstream-migrant fish facilities. Here, with the aid of those wicket-like hoops on the deck, they first fasten wire mesh to stout steel cables unreel from spools such as the one at right. Then they attach plastic mesh with 1/4-inch-square openings to the wire mesh with special clamps. As the net grows in

this fashion, it is being floated horizontally across the reservoir toward the Oregon shore. The bottom of the net will be allowed to sink when fabrication is completed, pulling the vast barrier into its vertical position. First of its kind ever built, the 2,800-foot-long and 120-foot-deep net is designed to prevent salmon and steelhead fingerlings from going through Brownlee's turbines or over its spillway as they swim downstream. Three ingenious "skimmers" attached to the net are

expected to trap the young migrants, which then will be delivered through a rubber pipeline to tank trucks on the Idaho shore. The trucks will return them to the river below Oxbow dam, 12 miles downstream. The Idaho Power company is spending several million dollars to build the pioneering facilities and expects to have them in operation in August. Brownlee will produce the first of its 360,000 kilowatts of power by September.

Nyssa Library Tells New List Of Adult Fiction

Ice Palace by Edna Ferber depicts Alaska's modern, vigorous people, its dramatic weather and scenery, its desperate, still-unfinished struggle for statehood and here, too, are the men from "The Outside" determined to exploit a fabulously rich Alaska for their own gains.

Moses, Prince of Egypt by Howard Fast is a masterly fictionalization of Moses' early life. Moses is introduced as an 11-year-old princeling, presumably the offspring of the Pharaoh Ramses and his sister, Enekas-Amon, and therefore the leading contender of the throne.

Anatomy of a Murder by Robert Traver. Perhaps this case was Bieglar's province. Outwardly sardonic and cynical, he could certainly show his young rival, Mitch, who had won from him the only job he loved, as well as the state prosecutor's whole staff, that he could defend better than they could prosecute.

The Winthrop Woman by Anya Seton. Through Bess Winthrop's three marriages, passionate beliefs and countless rebellions against bigotry, this perceptive novel (which is also an authoritative and thoroughly documented account) portrays the fortitude, humiliation and ultimate triumph of the Winthrop woman, who believed in a concept of happiness transcending that of her own day.

Maggie—Now by Betty Smith is a story of a wonderful girl growing up in the wonderful world of Brooklyn. Some of Maggie—Now's warm and steadfast friends worried when, at 23, she met and married Claude. He came out of nowhere to marry her. Each spring he left her because a chinook wind was blowing from the west and each fall he returned to her to fill her life with love, wonder and splendor. He was not, assuredly, the stuff of which solid husbands are made. In short, Maggie—Now, like her mother, married a leaver.

A Summer Place by Sloan Wilson. The summer place from which Sloan Wilson's novel takes its title is an island off the coast of Maine. It is beautiful in summer. It is terrifying in winter—as though, when the summer people are away, their icy snobberies, their fears of committing social errors remain to haunt the empty beaches.

The Travels of Jaimie McPheeters by Robert Lewis Taylor is a sweeping, romance-warmed story of the journey of a father and his son answering the lure of California gold in 1849.

The Northern Light by A. J. Cronin tells the story of a true hero, a dedicated man who struggles against enormous odds to maintain his faith, his integrity, indeed his very life.

Centenary at Jalna by Mazo De La Roche carries the famous Whiteoak saga into the mid-1950's and to that summer day when the boisterous and fiercely loyal family gathered to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the old house—Jalna.
