Nyssa's Beetmen Edge by Grandview 9 to 8; Trounce Weiser 12 to 6; Lead Border League with 5-0 Record

Nyssa's Beetmen, still leading Border league standings with a five won, none lost record, hammered out two more league wins this past week. The Beetmen edged by Grandview Friday 9 to 8 and they trounced Weiser here Tuesday night 12 to 6. Friday night Nyssa slammed out 17 hits to Grandview's 6 but the Beetmen also made 6 errors to their opponents' one, allowing them to score their 8 runs. Floyd Hale, hitting .357, hit 3 for 4 and Ron Bates, with a .432, hit 3 for 5. Both men included a double in their hits.

Bob Perkins, with a one won, none lost record, started on the mound for the Beetmen and was relieved in the fifth by Tony Burke, three won and none lost, who received credit for the win.

The Beetmen still were having no trouble hitting Tuesday night as they pounded out 15 hits to Weiser's 7. Nyssa made 4 errors to the visitors' 5. John Simianer, hitting .323, led the Beetmen batting with 3 for 4, including two doubles. Jack Bowen, .366, hit a triple and a double in four times at bat.

Ray Barnes, with a 1-1 record, started the game for the Beetmen.

25 Wheat Growers In County Vote On Referendum

Ten percent of Malheur county's eligible wheat farmers turned out Friday and approved continuation of federal marketing quotas on the 1959 crop with a favorable majority of 80 percent.

According to the Agricultural Conservation office in Ontario, there were 25 votes cast in this county—23 voting yes and 2 voting no. From approximately 1500 wheat farms in Malheur, 250 growers were eligible to vote under ASC regulations.

Latest returns from wheat growing states indicated more than two-thirds majority required for continuation of the quotas. Returns from 25 states reporting earlier this week were tabulated as a favorable majority of 79.4 percent. No returns were available on Oregon, but it was believed the statewide vote was similar to Malheur county and the nation.

With approval of the marketing quotas, price support will be available to farmers who comply with their farm wheat acreage allotments at a national average of not less than \$1.81 per bushel, or 75 percent of parity.

Nyssa's Junior Legion baseball team split two games with Vale this past week, beating them last Wednesday 8 to 4, but dropping the next one here in Nyssa Saturday night 5 to 2.

Bee Colonies Hurt As Result of Seed Production Dusting

A severe loss of bees has been reported in several bee colonies in the Adrian area, according to Delbert Garner, Sunset Valley alfalfa seed grower. Parathion is the chemical suspected of causing the trouble, County Agent Leeds Bailey says, since this poison is highly toxic to bees as well as other insects.

Bailey pointed out that bees are necessary to pollinate the legume seed crops and that dusting for seed production is a waste of time and money if the pollinators are killed.

Bailey suggested that Demeton or Systox be applied instead of the Parathion. He said its longer residual value for killing aphids and mites helps balance out its higher cost. Hay treated with Demeton should not be fed to livestock.

The best time to apply the insecticide is in the evening after the bees have quit the field, Bailey said. This gives the chemical an opportunity to lose some of its killing power before the bees enter the field the next day.

Spraying is preferred over dusting as there is less opportunity of the insecticides drifting to adjoining fields. Bailey suggested that farmers notify bee keepers when fields are to be treated in the vicinity of bee colonies.
