PETE'S T.V. TIPS

Does your set have an antenna clip on the back? An antenna clip (or clothespin, as they are commonly called) on your set may save you much inconvenience. On many sets the antenna lead in wire is connected directly to the antenna terminals on the back of the set without the use of a clothespin. If the set is moved, the wire may be broken off or one wire may touch another. If this happens, snow or a very weak picture will result. If your set has these symptoms, always look for the trouble here first before calling your serviceman. I always install free antenna clothespins to prevent such occurrences. Incidentally, in case of electrical storms you can easily remove the clothespin and thus prevent damage to your set. Also, be sure to disconnect the power plug as lightning can enter your set either through the antenna or power line.

A reader of this column wrote me and asked me to explain picture tube rejuvenation. The life of your picture tube may be extended by this method. This will be the subject of next week's column.
