An 81-year-old Payette woman was hospitalized as the result of a four-car accident last Wednesday night at the intersection of highway 20-26 and Morgan avenue, about halfway between Nyssa and Ontario.

Mrs. Cora Stockfleth was confined in the Holy Rosary hospital in Ontario for a fractured knee, facial cuts and bruises. Attendants reported her condition as "good".

Mrs. Stockfleth was a passenger in an auto driven by 68-year-old George Stockfleth, also of Payette. The Stockfleth car was pulling west across the highway from Morgan avenue when it was struck on the right side by an auto driven by James Ray Osborn, 54, Ontario.

A car being driven north on the highway by Betty Perkins Dane of Nyssa also scraped the Osborn car at the time of the impact. The Osborn car then careened into a car on the other side of the highway on Morgan ave. driven by George Stock of Nyssa.

Stockfleth was also treated at Holy Rosary Wednesday night for bruises and abrasions and released. Osborn was fined \$10 in J. F. Peter's Ontario Justice court for failure to yield the right of way.
