

Beetmen Take Three More Games To Lead Border League With 7-0 Record in Season's League Play

Nyssa's Beetmen, last year's Border league champions, moved three steps closer to the same honors this year as they chalked up three more league wins to lead the Border league with a 7 won, 0 lost record, to record their ninth straight win, and to give themselves a 9 won, 1 lost record for all games played this season.

This past week Nyssa beat Payette here 4 to 2, trounced Nampa here 10 to 3 and edged by Mountain Home there 5 to 4.

Friday night in Nyssa the Beetmen trailed Payette in the hit column by one as they managed only six, but they managed four runs to Payette's two and made only three errors while the visitors flubbed five times.

Double, Single Win Game

Floyd Hale's double and Ray Barnes' bunt single won the game for the Beetmen. Tony Burke was the winning pitcher and it made his record 4-0 for the season.

Sunday when the Beetmen met Nampa here the hitters went wild, racking up 13 hits for 10 runs to Nampa's 4 hits for 3. Both squads made three errors during the evening. John Simianer led the local batting with four hits in five times at bat. Jack Bowen also had a good night with two doubles and a single. Bob Perkins received credit for the win and now has a 2 won, none lost record.

Mountain Home Tough

The Nyssa squad had a little tougher time of it in Mountain Home Tuesday night against the Air Force team but they managed to squeeze out five runs to

the hometown team's four. The Beetmen managed eight hits to Mountain Home's five, but they also made five errors to Mountain Home's three. Larry Bates had two hits for the evening with three RBI's and is still hitting .548 for the season.

Burke was the winning pitcher (his record now 5-0) but he was relieved in the seventh by Barnes.

The July 11 Beetmen game scheduled for Nyssa has been changed and the local team will be traveling to Nampa on that date. No home games will be played here this week.

A Nyssan is being held in the Malheur county jail this week as the result of an argument over a fishing outing on the Snake river last Wednesday evening.

George W. Washington, Nyssa, was arraigned in A. F. Peter, Ontario Justice court, in the absence of Justice Don Graham from Nyssa last week, for assault with a dangerous weapon last Thursday.

Washington was charged with attacking Harold Downing, also from Nyssa, with a knife about 7 o'clock Wednesday evening after an argument while the two were fishing in the river near Nyssa.

Downing was treated at Malheur Memorial hospital at 7:25 p.m. Wednesday for lacerations of the chin and released in "good condition." Washington is being held in the county jail pending further action.

Two Grass Fires Call Fire Dept. To Nyssa Homes

The Nyssa Volunteer Fire department was called out Friday and again Monday to grass fires on city residential property.
