

Council Studies Varied Problems At Meeting

Consideration of the fire hazards of vacant lots, a study of the city dump and study of estimate to improve existing sewage disposal facilities were but a few of the many items on the agenda of the city council's regular meeting Tuesday night.

The council directed City Attorney Hal Henington to prepare a revision or a replacement for the city's existing ordinance dealing with grass, weeds and brush on vacant lots to be considered at their next regular meeting after consideration of the fire hazard such lots pose within the city limits.

posited refuse between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. from June 27 through July 6, was discussed by the council and they requested that City Manager A. R. (Jack) Middaugh secure an estimated cost of replacing the fence around the dump. The possibility of setting hours for dumping after the fence is installed was also discussed by the council. Traffic at the dump during the 10-day period surveyed averaged about 21 vehicles per day, varying from as few as 11 to as many as 36 in a single day.

The council also considered the latest engineering estimates on the replacing of city sewer facilities from the sewer lift station to the sewer treatment plant. Estimates indicate the cost of such work would be between \$18,000 and \$23,000.

Trailer Ordinance Delayed

In other actions the council: Deferred the second reading of ordinance 377 pertaining to the regulation of the location of trailer houses in Nyssa. The ordinance was first read in October. According to city officials, however, any trailers that may be moved into other than trailer parks since the first reading of the ordinance would be governed by the ordinance when and if the council should pass it.

Heard a protest from Bernard Frost, who owns property in Nyssa, of a "noise nuisance" from the Desert Seed company. Frost told the council he would bring in a petition for abatement of the noise.

Nyssans Injured In Two-Car Wreck Wednesday Night

Nyssa's city clerk, Mrs. Robert Montgomery; her husband; sister, Claudia Peterson, and brother, Sherman, sustained injuries in a two-car collision which occurred on the Adrian-Wilder highway at an intersection one mile west of Wilder last Wednesday at about 8 p.m.

Charles Griffith of Lompoc, Calif., driver of the other car involved, died from injuries received in the collision and his wife, Ethel, was listed in critical condition in a Caldwell hospital. Two other passengers in the Griffith car, Mrs. Loraine Biles and Barbara Biles of Parma, sustained minor injuries.

Mrs. Peterson received extensive bruises, slight brain concussion and has been confined at home by direction of her physician until the latter part of this week. Mr. Peterson, who was driver of their car, sustained cuts on his head and knee and bruises but was able to return to work at Ray's Food Fair Tuesday.

Claudia Peterson also suffered brain concussion and extensive bruises while Sherman is recovering from bumps on his leg and chest and bruises, it was reported.
