Auto Gets Stuck On UP Railroad Early Monday

A motor vehicle attempted to take over the railroad in the wee hours Monday morning, but instead of saving gasoline road taxes, the driver had to pay \$15 to get his car removed from the Union Pacific tracks.

Tom Jones, Nyssa U.P. agent, said that two apparently inebriated individuals continued south from the end of Nyssa's South First street and drove their car onto the left leg of the railroad's "Y" which connects with the Homedale branch and the main track. While driving toward the main track, the car became wedged in a switch and all automatic rail equipment became inoperative.

A crew of five railroad employees attempted to move the motor vehicle which was reported to have been "really stuck," making it necessary to call for Waggoner's wrecker service to remove the car.

No citations were issued and no names were obtained, although a billfold containing three liquor licenses, all with the same name, and another name embossed on the billfold was found the next morning at the scene of the tie-up.

Oregon Produce Grade Revisions To Be Studied

A public hearing by the Oregon Department of Agriculture has been scheduled in Portland July 25 to consider revisions of Oregon produce grades to bring them in line with U.S. grades, according to Turner Bond, county extension agent.

Grades to be considered will cover the state's major fruit crops and potatoes, cauliflower, celery, corn and lettuce.

Of chief interest to the local area, Bond reported, will be consideration of the Oregon standard grade for potatoes. Minimum standards under the local marketing agreement have fixed U.S. No. 2 grade as the minimum grade that can be sold and the Oregon standard has in some respects allowed quality below U.S. No. 2. It is proposed that shape requirements of the standard grade be set equal to the shape requirement of U.S. No. 2, so the standard grade will meet marketing agreement minimums.

Hearing time is set for 1:30 p.m. in the state office building in Portland.

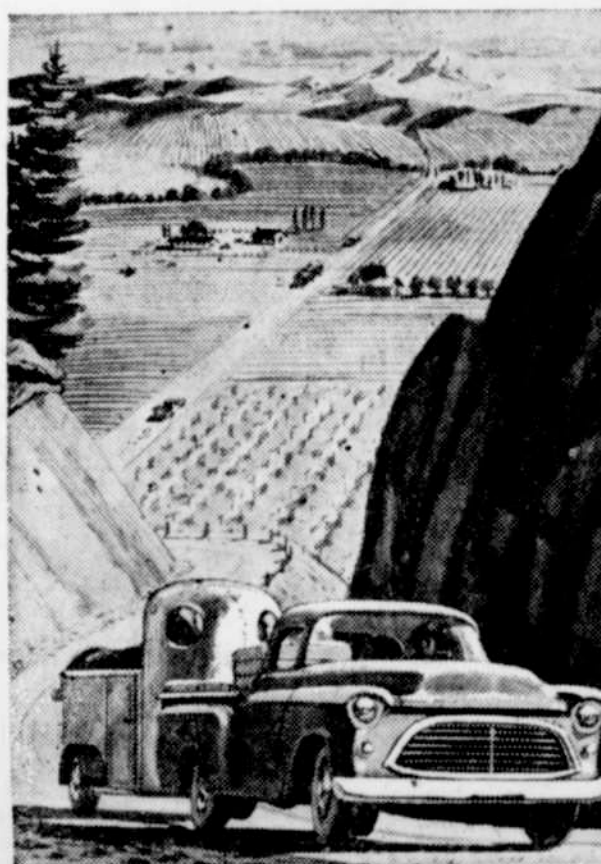
