Specifications, plans and contract documents may be examined at the office of the City Manager, City Hall, Nyssa, Oregon. Plans and specifications will be furnished upon receipt of a deposit of \$7.50 for each set of documents. Deposits will be refunded to all except the successful bidder, upon return of the set of documents in good condition within 60 days from the bid date.
