Nyssa Praised For Trade Show Exhibit Plans

"Valley-wide interest and participation in the forthcoming Boise-Treasure Valley Manufacturers-Wholesalers Trade show is being demonstrated through the Nyssa Chamber of Commerce which is planning to enter a community exhibit," according to Roger Hancock, general chairman of the event.

Nyssa will join the Ontario and Vale chambers in preparing an industrial booth at the Treasure Valley display in Boise in September, built around the theme of Oregon's Centennial year and the twin gateways, in cooperation with the Oregon Centennial commission.

Others Listed
"Community exhibits are being prepared by local chambers of commerce in several cities throughout the Treasure Valley," Hancock disclosed, "for the purpose of explaining the manufacturing - industrial - wholesaling progress of the valley area."

"Among those others who have announced their intention to participate are the Caldwell, Council, Fruitland, Gem county, Marsing, Nampa, Meridian, Payette, Idaho City, Weiser and Boise Chambers of Commerce."

"The Boise, Treasure Valley Trade show, to be held in Boise Sept. 4-7 at Boise Junior college, is planned to stimulate a greater interest in the products manufactured, processed and distributed here in the Treasure Valley," stated Hancock, chairman of the Boise Chamber's wholesale, manufacturing and transportation committee, which is staging the event in cooperation with the Treasure Valley Chambers of Commerce.

Fischer Is Committeeman
"In addition to the community exhibits, Hancock said, 'there will be about 100 displays prepared by valley production firms, wholesalers and transportation firms. These firms will point up the theme of the trade show which is 'In Treasure Valley, we make it—we sell it—and we ship it.'"

"A valley-wide committee is co-ordinating the sales of exhibit spaces, Hancock advised, 'and the member from Nyssa is Jake Fischer. Deadline for securing exhibit space is drawing near and interested exhibitors are invited to call on the local committee member, the Nyssa Chamber of Commerce or contact the Boise Chamber of Commerce.'"

State of Oregon To Let Contracts For County Roads

Tuesday the Oregon state highway commission received bids for the improvement of two county roads in Malheur county along with bids on some 17 projects in the state calling for 23.9 miles of grading, 18.69 miles of stone base, 12.8 miles of oil mat wearing surface, 3.52 miles of asphaltic concrete pavement, the construction of six reinforcement bridges and two roadside improvement projects.

One of the Malheur projects will be the surfacing of Lytle south to a connection with the boulevard extending from Vale north end of the project which was constructed last year.

The other section is on Foot-hills drive and extends from Vale to a point approximately four miles east of Vale. The new roadbeds are to be constructed with 11 inches of rock base on which will be placed oiled surfaces 20 feet wide.

The work on these two county roads is scheduled to be completed by early next summer.

Contracts on the bids received are set to be awarded by the state highway commission at its regular meeting in Salem today and tomorrow. The 17 projects are estimated to cost \$2,000,000.

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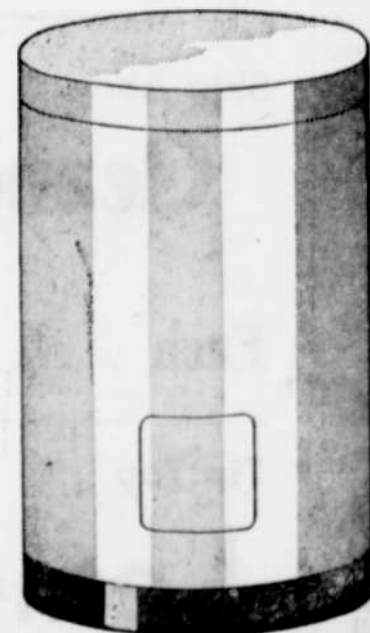
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
