

Rural Fire Dept. Answers Call to Combine Blaze



NYSSA'S RURAL FIRE department sent two trucks in answer to an alarm at the Desert Sheep company about 5 1/4 miles southwest of the city Thursday shortly before noon. The fire was in a combine that had been pulled into the sheep company's

yard for repairs. Fire Chief Ralph Lawrence said the blaze in the combine was apparently caused by welding on the machine. The fire had been brought "pretty well under control" through the use of the

Seed Growers To View Studies Of Alkali Bee

Alfalfa seed growers will have an opportunity to see the latest developments in the alkali bee research program at a meeting Aug. 7, according to Leeds Bailey, county extension agent. The meeting will start at 10 a.m. at the alkali bee bed located northwest of Adrian on George Schiemer's lower place near the Owyhee river.

W. P. Stephen, bee specialist from Oregon State college, and Dick Epley, research assistant, will be on hand to explain work being carried out. Seed producers will view the soil type, moisture conditions and other factors favorable for bee nesting sites. Bailey said the meeting would be of special interest to seed growers who want to establish new bee colonies or expand existing sites.

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March of Dimes Expanded Plans Announced Here

An expanded program that will permit a scientific assault on major health problems of the nation was announced last week by the National Foundation for infantile Paralysis, according to Malheur county chairman, Ralph Lawrence, after Basil O'Connor, president of the organization, outlined its new program.

"This is our concept for the future: The development of an organized voluntary force in the fields of medical research, patient care and professional education, flexible enough to meet new health problems as they arise, with specific goals initially," O'Connor said.

Lawrence said that the National Foundation, as it now will be known, would carry on its winning fight against polio, continue its history-making virus research program and make investigations of disorders of the central nervous system, and to these activities would add research and, in the near future, a patient aid program in arthritis and birth defects.

The expanded program will be financed, he said, through the traditional March of Dimes conducted each January since 1938 by volunteers in 3,100 chapters across the country.

Lawrence said the new program was adopted after five years of investigation of areas of need in the health field and careful assessment of the strengths of the National Foundation that could be applied to other problems.

PETE'S T.V. TIPS

Many customers unknowingly pay needless repair bills. How does this happen? Soon after their T.V. set is repaired the same trouble reappears. The customer is very understandably annoyed. At this point he fails to notify the original serviceman.

Instead, a new serviceman is called. This is a mistake that hurts the pocket-book. Remember: A reliable serviceman guarantees all replacement parts and workmanship for a period of 90 days. Therefore, why pay twice for the very same repair job? Your serviceman checks all replacement parts before installing them in your set. Despite this precaution, however, a new part sometimes fails after it has operated in your set for a few days.

I guarantee all replaced parts for a period of 90 days, except picture tubes which are guaranteed for 1 year. No additional charge is made for replacement of defective parts within the 90-day period.
