Beetmen Win Two More Games, One By Forfeit, to Cinch First Place

Nyssa Trails

Friday night the Beetmen traveled to Payette for their next-to-the-last game of the season with the second-place Packers and were beaten by a last-of-the-ninth homer.

Payette led off with two runs in the first inning and added two more in the third but the Beetmen came back in the fourth inning with three runs of their own, thanks to two hits and four walks. Payette then added one more to their own making the score 5 to 3.

In the fifth Ronnie Bates got on with a walk. Then a single by John Simianer and a double by Bates scored two more Beetmen runs. However, the Packers maintained their two-run lead when they, too, added a couple more in the fifth.

Homer Wins Game

Holding Payette scoreless in the sixth, seventh and eighth, the Beetmen tied the score up when R. Bates, who again got on with a walk, scored on Catcher Heberger's triple in seventh and when Floyd Hale scored on a single by Outfielder Hill in the eighth.

But it was the Packer's Outfielder Staab who brought the 7-7 contest to a screaming halt when he slammed out a one-run homer in the last of the ninth.

Pitcher Ballard started the contest for the Beetmen with Ray Barnes relieving in the second inning and Bob Perkins coming into the game in the fifth to be credited with the loss.

Nyssa Still Leads

Hill and Simianer both had two Beetmen hits for the evening with Heberger slamming out a triple and B. Bates getting a double. Nyssa had a total of nine hits, Payette 10.

The loss left the Beetmen in league standings with a 9 won, 2 lost record but moved Payette even higher in second place with an 8-2 record. Nyssa had only Mountain Home left to play Tuesday night and Payette still had two games to go.

Graham's Navy Re-Enlistment Marks 15 Years

Nyssa's Justice of the Peace Don Graham is still a Navy man at heart. His latest reenlistment in the Navy's "ready" reserve last month (he just received his papers) testifies to that.

Gunner's Mate 1st class Graham first enlisted in the U.S. Navy Feb. 5, 1942, and he's been in either the regular Navy or the reserves ever since that time—over 15 years.

He served three years in the active service after that first enlistment, then went into the reserves, was called back into active service for 14 months during the Korean conflict, and has been in the "ready" reserves since that time.

Now, according to his reenlistment papers signed by the commandant of the 13th Naval district, Gunner's Mate Graham is still in the Navy for another "hitch."

Weiser Kings-Xer

Monday night here Nyssa had little trouble downing Weiser in a non-league game with five runs although they let the Prospectors squeeze in three of their own in the last four innings after holding them scoreless for the first part of the game.

The Beetmen started things off right with two runs in the first inning and three more in the third, but couldn't manage to score for the rest of the game. Ronnie Bates led Nyssa's hitting with a double and a single.

Little Leaguers End Play Tonight

Nyssa's Little leaguers, sponsored by Sinclair Distributor Frank Morris and Thompson Insurance agency and coached by Dale Bingham, didn't see any action this past week and have set their last game of the season for tonight at Nyssa's city park against Ontario.

Beetmen Now Set First in League

Nyssa's Beetmen won at least a tie for first place in the Border league Tuesday night the easy way—Mountain Home forfeited the last league game of the season.

This gives the Beetmen, last year's league winners, a 10 won, 2 lost record (season record—15-4) and assures them of at least a tie for first place with second place Payette. The Packers have two games yet to play and now have an 8-2 record. One of these games, with Nampa, was rained out Tuesday night and will have to be made up.

Friday, Saturday and Sunday the Beetmen will be playing in the Idaho state tournament with many of the Border league squads, but league standings will not be at stake. Whether the Nyssa squad will take first place or tie for it will be entirely up to the Payette squad.

Jr. Legion Wins Double Header From Baker Team

Nyssa's Junior Legion baseball squad, coached by Elmer Jaques, wound up their season's league play with a double win over Baker Sunday to put them in third place.

The Nyssa team took the first game of the double header in Baker 14 to 4 and eased by the second one 7 to 5. Pitcher Dave Sewright got credit for both wins. Burton Smith was the day's leading hitter, pounding out three triples.

In the first game, with Sewright going all the way, Smith hit 4 for 5, including two triples, a double and a single. Catcher Clark Jaques also slammed out 4 for 5 with a triple and three singles. Jerry Myrick and Dennis Savage both hit additional triples in the first game to give the Nyssa Juniors a total of 5 for the game.

Smith hit another triple in the second game and Savage racked up a double.

Knut Stoneberg was Nyssa's starting pitcher in the second contest, but Sewright relieved him in the fourth and went on to win his second game of the day.

The Baker double header was the squad's last league games for this season although Coach Jaques says they may play some additional practice games this summer. In fact, they have tentatively set such a game with Payette for tonight.

John Day wound up the season with a 9 won, 3 lost Junior Legion league record. Vale placed second with an 8-4, Nyssa third with a 7-5 and Baker trailed the league with none won and 12 lost.

Sunday's wins gave the Nyssa squad a 10 won, 8 lost season's record.

State Police Say Raids Not Connected With Labor Report

some news stories in Portland papers implying that the raids resulted from a recent report on migrant labor to the Oregon State Labor department.

Police Action "Usual"

He told the Journal that violations of state law existed in the county and that, in view of this, there was nothing unusual about the state police's action. They were handled, he said, just as similar instances have been handled in Portland and other areas throughout the state.

About 10 o'clock last Wednesday night some 15 Oregon state police officers, including reinforcements from Baker, Pendleton and Milwaukie, descended upon the nine establishments, serving 20 warrants charging conducting a gambling game and operating a slot machine and taking those served before Justice of the Peace A. F. (D) Peters in Ontario. Prepared by District Attorney

The state police were armed with two warrants they were unable to serve. The complaints were prepared by Malheur county District Attorney E. Otis Smith and signed by two state police officers who had been in the county for a couple of weeks conducting the investigation.

The state police conducted the raid independently of local law enforcement officers in all three towns. Lt. Harrell said it was "strictly an Oregon state police action."

Nyssa was the only area that escaped a slot machine charge. Arrests for operating a slot machine were made in both Vale and Ontario. All those arrested in Nyssa and Vale entered pleas of guilty as they paraded before Judge Peters from 10 p.m. until about 1 a.m. but, with one exception, those arrested in Ontario entered not guilty pleas.

Nyssa Warrants

From Nyssa, Marion Tracy, owner of the Olympic club, and employee, Pete Kasulis; Clara N. Rambaud, owner of the Ace Pastime, and employee, Bernardino Uriste; and Damon Savage, owner of the Nyssa Tavern, and employee, Fred Williams, all entered pleas of guilty to conducting a gambling game. The owners were fined \$50 plus \$4.50 costs and the employees \$25 plus the same costs.

From Vale, George Troy, owner of the Stockmen's club, and employee, Blanche Montague, and Dick Bashford, owner of the Golden Slipper, and employee, Lellie Lorraine Palmer, entered pleas of guilty to charges of operating and using a slot machine. Their fines were the same as the Nyssans.

Ontario Raids

In Ontario, Antler's club employee Gilbert Lopes pleaded guilty on the slot machine charge and was fined \$29.50. Others who entered pleas of not guilty included George Warrington, owner of the Antler's club, two charges—conducting a gambling game and operating a "nickel in the slot" machine, \$50 bail on both charges; Mrs. Helen Warrington, slot machine charge, \$30 bail; George Yturri, one of the owners of the Big 4, conducting a gambling game, \$50 bail; Big 4 employee, Frank Canas, same charge, \$30 bail; Raymond Plaza, co-owner of the Plaza tavern, operating and using a slot machine, \$50 bail; Plaza employee, Frank Echani, same charge, \$30 bail; Don C. Grafe, owner of Moore hotel lounge, slot machine charge, \$50 bail, and Moore hotel employee, Neal Williams, same charge, \$30 bail.

Nyssa Recreation Program Closes Friday Afternoon

Nyssa's summer recreational program will come to a close this week with a field day and watermelon feed at the park Thursday and recreational swimming at the Ontario pool Friday afternoon, Dwight Dickey, director of this year's program, announced. There will be no scheduled activities Friday morning, he stated.

This summer's program has drawn a record enrollment of 283 youngsters from age six to 14 years. The activities opened June 9 under the direction of Dickey, assisted by Miss Judy Savage of Nyssa. A variety of activities were arranged including recreational swimming three afternoons each week at the Ontario pool and Red Cross swimming instruction for a two weeks' period the forepart of July, handicraft, softball and many organized sports at Nyssa park.

Political Changes Faced

Jones stated that if Snider receives the appointment as circuit judge, he will have to withdraw from the contest for state representative in the November general election. He is opposed for that office by Republican Ed Oakes of Ontario. The county chairman further stated that Snider has not indicated whether he would be a candidate for the non-partisan post in the general election to fill the late Judge Biggs' unexpired term which extends until Jan. 2, 1963. The position carries a \$10,500 annual salary.

Jones May Enter Race

The county Democratic chairman stated that if the appointment of Snider is made by Gov. Holmes, the Democratic Central committee would be obliged to name a successor to Snider to run as Democratic candidate for state representative. No names have been discussed by the central committee, Jones said, but he indicated that if the right person could not be found, he might accept the appointment, which would necessitate his resignation as county party chairman.

Snider defeated Emil A. Stunz, Nyssa, two-term representative for the Democratic nomination in the May 16 primary election with a vote of 1,328 to 890.

Laborer Leaves Unfinished Term, Displaced Radio

A transient laborer with a "string of aliases" was apprehended Saturday evening in downtown Nyssa and charged with drunkenness, Chief of Police E. L. Hansen reported. He was meted out a sentence of \$25 fine and 10 days in jail in Judge J. C. Smith's court Monday.

At the time of his apprehension, the man was carrying a portable battery radio in a paper bag. Upon questioning regarding the radio he claimed other laborers had loaned him the radio to listen to, Chief Hansen explained. In the meantime, Bob Wilson of Wilson Bros. Department store identified the radio in question as one from their store which had not been sold.

Before the "case of the radio" was completed the laborer disappeared from a work detail Tuesday and has not been seen since. Police reported that the same man had been apprehended several weeks earlier in possession of merchandise stolen from Ben Franklin store in Nyssa.

Nyssa Man Faces Assault Charge In Graham's Court

A Nyssa man was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Don Graham Tuesday evening on the charge of assault with a dangerous weapon.

Francisco Rodriguez, 35 year old worker from Nyssa's labor camp, appeared before Graham charged with attacking Cesar Alcocer, local farm labor contractor, with a knife in front of the El Sombrero tavern Sunday night about 7 o'clock.

Judge Graham set bail at \$250 until a preliminary hearing can be set for Rodriguez. He is being held in the Malheur county jail in lieu of bail.
