

Many Charges, Demur Result From Argument

An assault with a deadly weapon charge reduced to simple assault, a \$50 fine, a disturbing the peace charge and a demur—the first filed in Nyssa's Justice of the Peace court in the last 12 years he's held the office, according to Don Graham—, all resulted from a disagreement the evening of July 27.

Francisco Rodriguez, 35 year old worker from Nyssa's labor camp, appeared before Judge Graham at a preliminary hearing Friday charged with assault with a deadly weapon. He had been arrested before the Justice of the Peace last Tuesday evening, charged with attacking Cesar Alcocer, Nyssa, who at the time the charges were made gave his occupation as farm labor contractor, with a knife the preceding Sunday evening.

After hearing testimony from both Rodriguez and Alcocer, Graham reduced the charge to one of "assault". Rodriguez entered a plea of guilty to the reduced charge, was fined \$50 plus \$4.50 costs and preferred charges against Alcocer for disturbing the peace by throwing a beer bottle against the windshield of his car while his family was inside. Graham set Tuesday afternoon as the date for Alcocer's preliminary hearing.

Tuesday, Max S. Taggart, Ontario attorney, filed a demur in Graham's court on behalf of Alcocer protesting that "the throwing of a beer bottle at an automobile and the striking of an automobile therewith, or either of them, do not constitute a crime of disturbing the peace or any other crime—as defined by—statutes of the state of Oregon." Graham granted the demur upon the recommendation of District Attorney E. Otis Smith.

The local justice said this was the first demur to be filed since he first held the JP office some 12 years ago. In this time, Graham said, he has heard over 18,000 cases. In addition to Tuesday's demur, Graham said, only 2 appeals of judgements in the cases have been filed with the circuit court. One of these was dismissed and the other is still pending.

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Nyssa's Bank Name Changed Friday

With their name changed from the First National Bank of Portland, the oldest national bank on the Pacific coast on Friday had the newest name of any bank west of the Rocky mountains. Shareholders authorized the change

of names at a special meeting in Portland June 27. July 30 the change was officially approved by the comptroller of currency in Washington, D.C. Hewett said customers have been asked to continue to use their present supplies of checks, which will be received and processed in the usual manner. Work was underway this week on the changing of the bank's sign on the outside of their building. —Journal Photo.

Adrian Tax Up

In the Adrian community, school tax levies have been increased 3.9 mills, which is a smaller increase than the amount "feared" by school officials and numerous individuals who have been working closely with the recent reorganization plan. Last year district 61 levies were a total of 52.2 mills and the new levy amounts to 56.1 mills, divided among special school, 15.7; high school, 19.5 and the rural levy of 20.9.

Road District Cut

For the first time in several years there has been a reduction in the Nyssa Road Improvement district levy, which is now 19 mills or a reduction of 1 mill as the result of new rulings on the 6 percent limitation. Ontario's road district was also affected by the new ruling to make the levy 8.8 mills instead of 10 mills. Nyssa's Rural Fire Protection district has been reduced to .8 mills from 1 mill charged last year, this the result of greater assessed valuation.

Utility Value Up

Public utilities assessed valuation in the county was increased \$847,595 due to some new construction as well as an increase in ratio which affected only Malheur and Multnomah counties. The greatest benefit was realized in district 29, or Annex, near Weiser where the total assessed valuation climbed to \$1,069,935 from last year's \$692,293, mostly the result of new power transmission lines from the Brownlee power dam. Ontario Man Back In Malheur Jail After Local Arrest

An Ontario man who just finished serving a 52 1/2 day sentence in the Malheur county jail for stealing pillow cases and perfume from a Nyssa store June 23 was back there again this weekend for 87 1/2 days more for possession of a stolen radio.

Eduro Ramirez Lopez, of the Ontario labor camp and before that Tulsa, Okla., appeared before Justice of the Peace Don M. Graham Friday on a charge of larceny. However, Graham reduced the charge to that of possession of stolen goods. Lopez entered a plea of guilty to the reduced charge and was sentenced to 69 days in the county jail in lieu of the fine.

Nyssa police had apprehended Lopez with a radio stolen from Wilson Brothers Department store, after he had been released from the county jail only a few days before. Lopez had received time off his first sentence for working while confined.

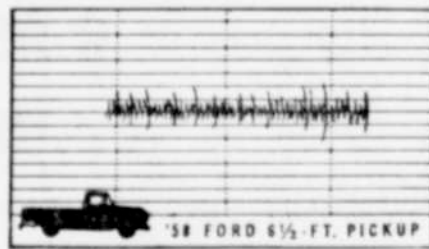
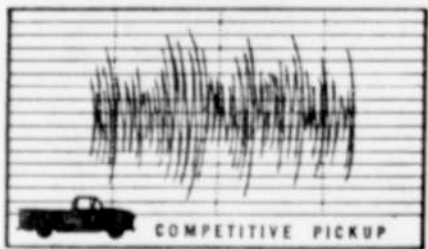
