

Nyssa Beetmen Win Two, Lose Two In Idaho State Tourney in Nampa As Boise Downs Them Two Times

Nyssa's Beetmen, playing for four days in the Idaho state tournament at Nampa, won two games and lost two this past week but the contests did not count in Border league standings. The Beetmen ran up more runs in their first game Friday than they did in the other three combined as they downed Boise 13 to 8. Pitcher Heberger was credited with the win, allowing 8 Boise hits.

Seven Beetmen slammed out more than one base hit in the runaway contest as Nyssa chalked up 21 hits for the day. Hill had a double, Filmore a double and a single, R. Bates, a double and a single, Heberger, a double and a home run, Simianer, a double and L. Bates and Dickey, both three singles.

Sunday against Mt. Home the Beetmen racked up 8 more hits to take that one 4 to 0 behind the three hit pitching of Smith, who allowed only five walks. A Nyssa double play in the seventh helped

secure the win.

But Monday and Tuesday the Beetmen had more trouble with the Boise squad as they dropped both games. Monday Perkins, who allowed 6 hits received the loss as Boise held Nyssa to three singles and took the game 5 to 1. Three Beetmen double plays for the game held Boise down but didn't discourage them.

Tuesday the Beetmen out hit Boise 8 to 6 but lost the game 5 to 3 as they left 11 men on the bases. Heberger's luck against the Boise squad ran out as he was charged with the loss. Perkins relieved him in the eighth. R. Bates and Hale both hit doubles for the Beetmen.

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Antelope, Unit Deer Hunts Set For This Month

Yesterday was the deadline for applications from antelope hunters and those who wished to be in on the Wallowa controlled deer hunt drawings, according to the Oregon State Game commission.

The drawing for these early season hunts will be held August 15. A total of 600 tags will be issued for the antelope hunt, 200 for each of the three areas and 500 tags for the Wallowa controlled deer hunt.

Season Dates Set

The antelope season has been scheduled for August 23 through August 27 and the Wallowa controlled deer hunt for August 30 through September 3. Hunters who received antelope tags last year were not eligible to participate in that hunt again this year. The Wallowa controlled deer hunt, new this year, is primarily a pack show in the heart of the Minan country and provides the hunter an opportunity to take two deer—a buck on his regular deer tag and an antlerless deer on the controlled deer tag.

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
