Swimming Party For Bruce Hipp

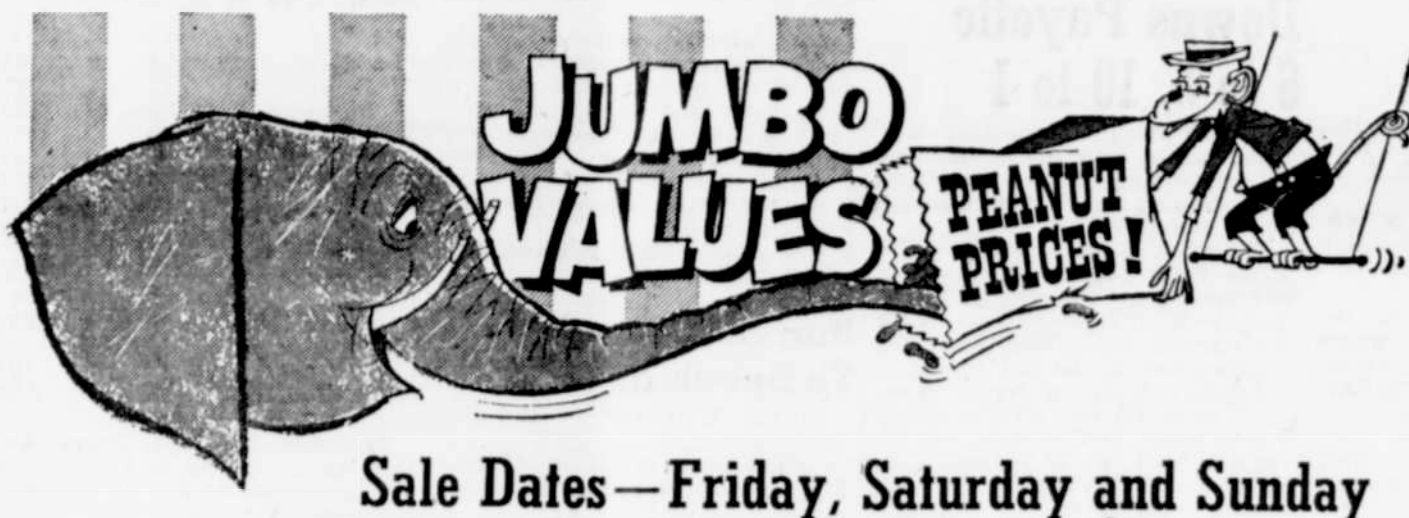
Bruce Hipp was honored on his birthday anniversary Saturday, July 26 with a swim party in the Vale pool.

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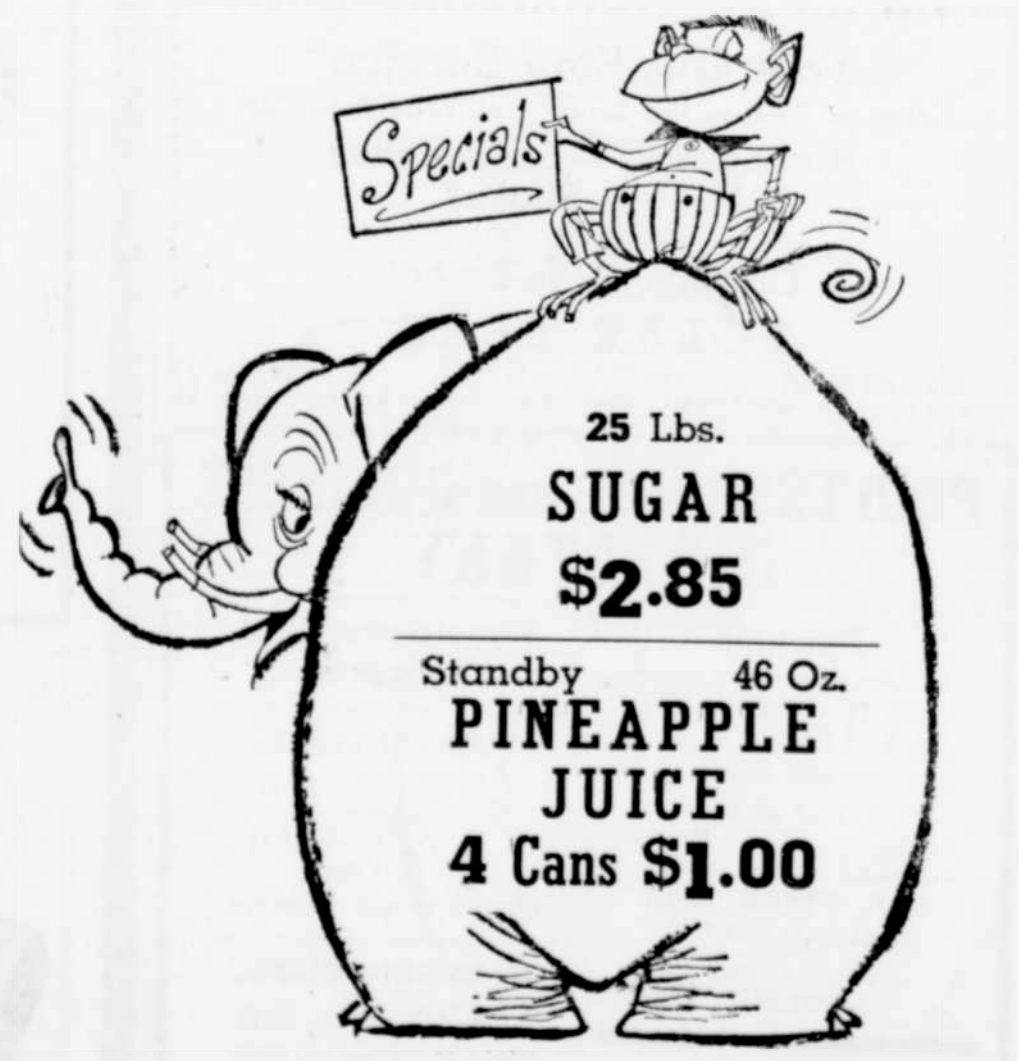
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
