Report Shows High 1957-58 Borrowing Farm Loan Credit

Farmers and ranchers in this area continued to use a sizeable volume of long-term credit during the last year, according to a farm loan association report.

Jesse Tremelling, secretary-treasurer of the Payette National Farm Loan association at Payette, reports that area farm and ranch operators used the services of the cooperatively-owned association to provide themselves with \$573,200 of credit during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1958. This money was obtained by association members in Malheur county and Washington, Payette and Adams counties in Idaho—the territory served by the NFPA.

"Refinancing of indebtedness, purchase of land and livestock, improvements to land and buildings and general farm operations were the major purposes for which money was borrowed, said Tremelling.

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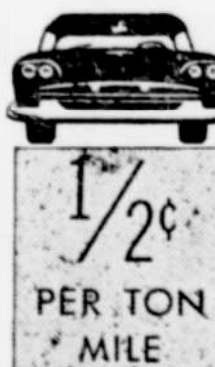
