The current scene in Europe, U. S. foreign relations, the autobiography of the woman with three personalities and an account of earth satellites head the list of books going into circulation Saturday, Aug. 16, at Malheur county library.

The Big Change in Europe by Blair Bolles is a comprehensive view of Europe and the change it has undergone between the first election of Eisenhower and the death of Stalin.

Ideas, People and Peace by Chester Bowles is a critical analysis of U. S. foreign policy with a proposal for favoring political and economic action ahead of military measures.

The Final Face of Eve by Evelyn Lancaster (a pseudonym) is Eve's own account of her family, childhood and personal relationships by the woman with three personalities who was the subject of "The Three Faces of Eve."

Countdown for Tomorrow by Martin Caidin is "the inside story of earth satellites, rockets and missiles and the race between American and Soviet science."

Papa's Daughter by Thyra Bjorn is more about the family in "Papa's Wife," telling of a Swedish girl's growing up, coming to Am-

erica, marriage and the flowering of her career as a writer.

Last in Convoy by James Pattinson is a suspenseful novel of the sea in wartime, about an unseaworthy ship on convoy duty and what happens to it and its crew when it is left behind by the convoy.

The Sleeping Mountain by John Harris is a narrative about the imminent eruption of a volcano on an Italian island and the citizens' complete disregard for their great peril.

Doctor Tom by Peter Wingate relates the adventures and amusing misadventures of an inexperienced young doctor in the East African jungles.

Owen Wister Out West is the journals and letters of the author of "The Virginian."

Fever in the Earth by William Owens is a novel of the Texas oil fields of the early 1900's and a young man who won his own oil fields by his own labor but was then struck by the plague of greed.

The Thing About Clarissa by Roberta St. Clair Cook is "a tale of mistaken intentions and young love."

It Happened to Didymus by Up-ton Sinclair is the story of young Tom Strawn and what he does with a miraculous gift.

The Midnight Plumber by Maurice Procter is a mystery in which Inspector Martineau is called upon to find the leader of a gang of armed men causing a crime wave in the city.

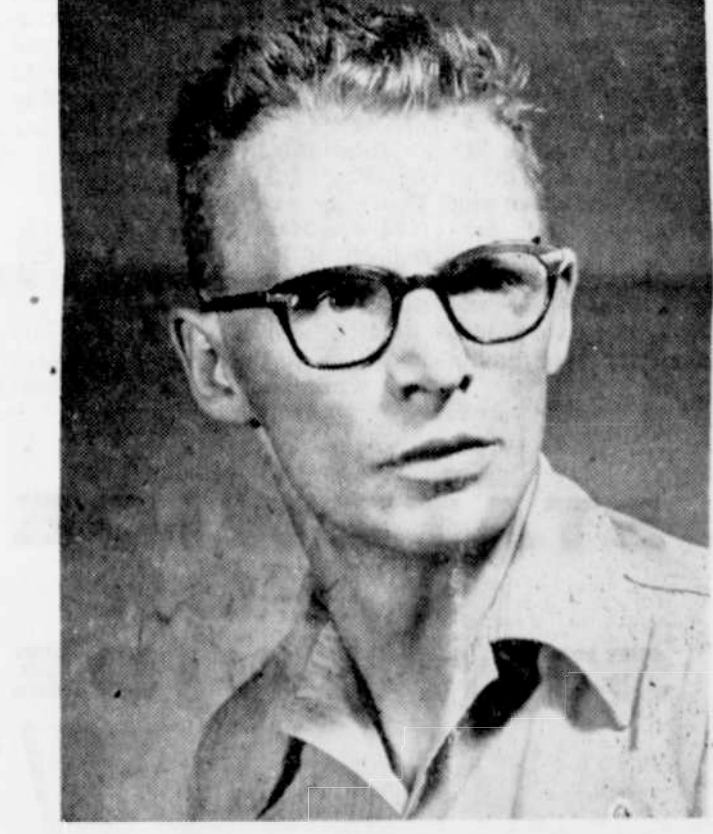
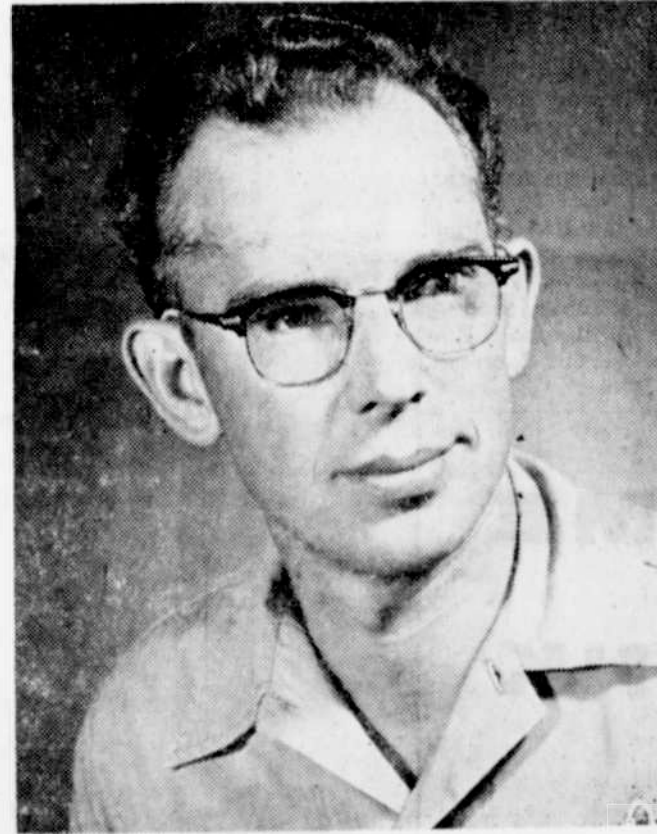
