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Burning Stubble Near Nyssa Raises Smoke



HOT, DRY WEATHER, interspersed with lightning storms, this past week caused a multitude of grass, range and wheat fires throughout Malheur county. Pictured above is a burning wheat stubble field west of Nyssa several miles, which, from a distance, gave all the appearances of a raging range fire. In fact, the Bureau of Land

Management office in Vale reported that stubble fires of this nature often require investigation by their firefighters when they have not been notified that a farmer plans to burn his field. Meanwhile, BLM crews were keeping busy with lightning-set range fires all over the county. Six fires were reported

ed Sunday night with the largest near Double mountain, about six miles south of Vale and another burning south of the Martin Sayer ranch west of Nyssa. Monday night three more fires broke out and at 11:45 a "sleeping" from the night's lightning was reported with one front over a mile and a half long.

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Council Hears Dog, Trailer Ordinances

Two ordinances—a dog leash ordinance and an ordinance regulating trailers and trailer parks—occupied a great deal of the city council's time at their regular meeting Tuesday night.

The council held their first reading of a dog leash ordinance to be referred to the voters at the November general election, if it is approved by the council on the third reading.

This ordinance was the result of a petition presented to the council March 11 with the signatures of 179 Nyssans urging the council to adopt an ordinance and/or other regulations providing for the prohibition and prevention of dogs running at large within the corporate limits of the city.

Tuesday night the council discussed the cost of enforcement of such an ordinance and the possibility of a levy measure on the ballot with the ordinance to provide the necessary revenue for such enforcement. It was estimated that such enforcement cost would run in the neighborhood of \$6,000 per year.

The council also had their second reading of a trailer regulation ordinance, first read last September. This ordinance, when and if read and passed the third time, would govern and regulate the parking of trailer houses and regulate trailer parks within the city.

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PETE'S T.V. TIPS

A question often asked is the cost of picture tube replacement. I wish this question could always be answered by quoting a price for the picture tube plus installation labor. But, unfortunately, this expenditure in itself will seldom result in a good picture.

After all, important though it is, a picture tube is only the last link in a long electronic chain. All the preceding links must also be in good working order before a good picture will result.

Many of us will tolerate a few minor defects in our set's performance before picture tube replacement. But never afterwards.

Average cost of a 21" tube is \$45.00. To this cost in most cases must be added the price of other replacement parts and labor to restore the set to proper working order.

"Other replacement parts and labor." That is the sticker. Find out how much this will cost and you will have your answer.
