### Social Security Pay in County Up 38 Percent

Old-age, survivors and disability insurance benefits are being paid in Malheur county at the rate of \$747,828 a year, according to Vernon A. Welo, manager of the La Grande social security district office. This is an increase of about 38 percent over last year, he said.

Welo reported that studies have shown that many of the recipients are aged people, widows and orphans who have little or no other resources. For about 9 percent of the beneficiaries, social security benefits received are the only sources of cash income, it was pointed out.

Payments to a retired worker average about \$65 a month, average for a widow with two young children is \$145 and the maximum payment for a retired couple is \$162.50 and the maximum for a family is \$200.

Several reasons were cited by Welo for the increase in benefits over last year, such as payment of benefits to people who were brought under the law for the first time in recent years—self-employed farmers, for example—reduction in the retirement age to 62 for women and starting of disability insurance benefits to disabled people 50 or over.

For the entire state, social security payments at the end of 1957 were being paid to 135,503 beneficiaries at the rate of \$7,568,800 a month.

According to U. S. Sen. Richard L. Neuberger, Malheur county has 1,196 persons receiving social security benefits for a monthly total of \$62,319.

### Produce Exhibit Pointers Given For County Fair

Leeds Bailey, county extension agent, offers some suggestions which may help you in selecting a winner for the produce exhibit at the county fair. He lists the following points which land products judges take into consideration in placing an exhibit.

Number one is uniformity in size, color, and general appearance. In placing a class of six peppers, for example, the entry whose peppers are all the same size will place over an entry whose peppers are larger but vary in size. So Bailey suggests selection for uniformity rather than size. Average size or slightly above is large enough.

Other defects that the judges look for include blemishes, insect damage and evidence of disease.

In selecting an exhibit, the extension agent suggests picking several times the required number of fruit or vegetables and then match them, eliminating the produce that doesn't fit the size and type selected.
