#### 4-H Camp Held

Six local leaders directed camp activities and acted in a supervisory capacity.

Camp activities included crafts, party games, safety, wildlife swimming, boating and a daily campfire program.

Officer Matt Vice of the Idaho state police conducted the class on safety and also explained the duties of the state police system.

John Jensen of the Oregon State Game commission handled a series of discussions on wildlife.

A series of lessons for beginning swimmers were given by Margie Elfering of Vale and Dick Fulwiler of Willowcreek. These two handled all waterfront activities for the entire camp.

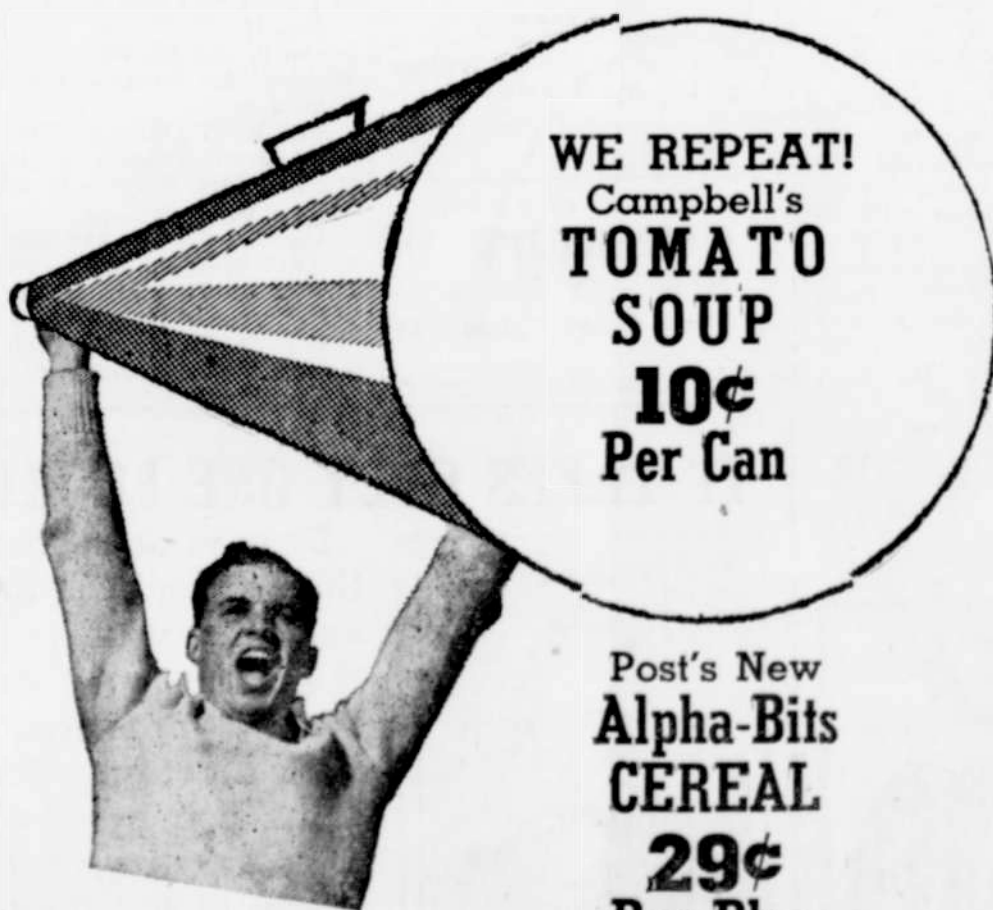
