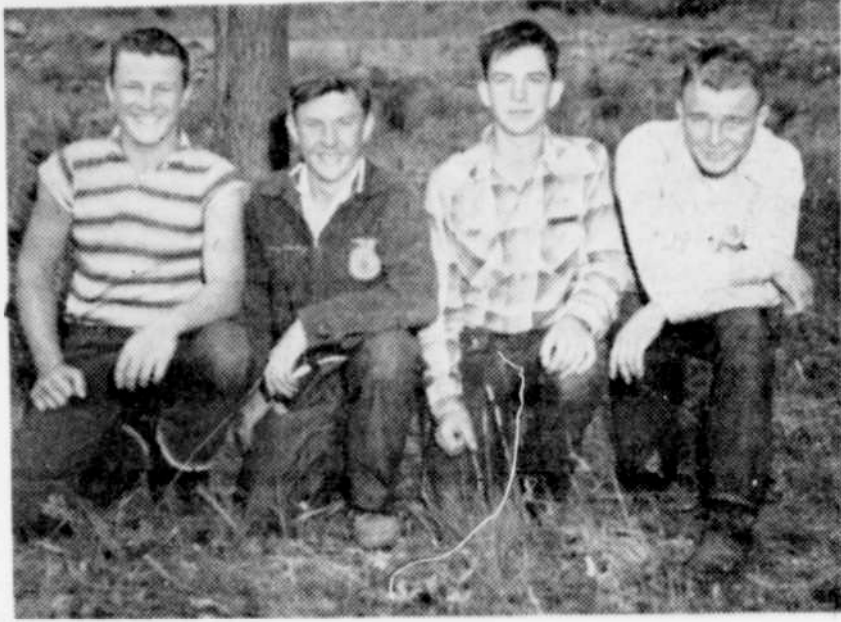


Malheur Boys Attend Range Camp



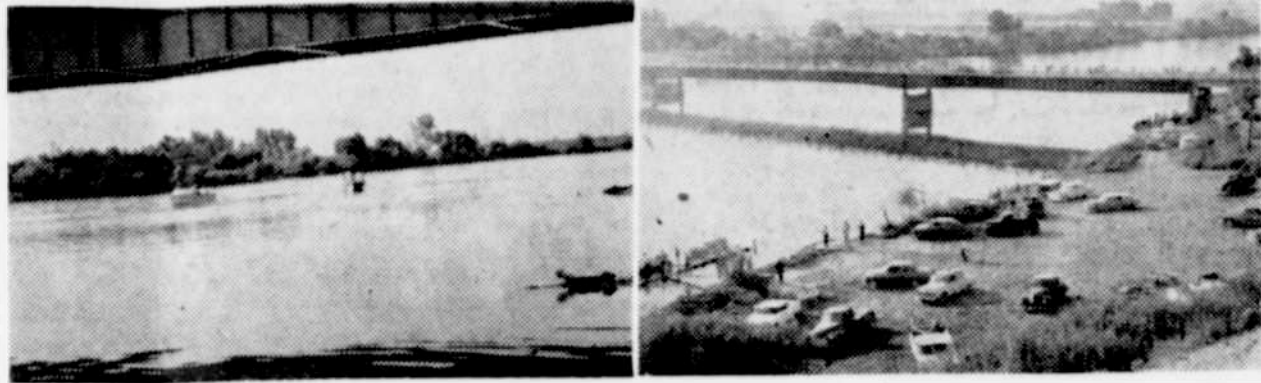

Two Others Hurt Early Sunday morning, shortly after midnight, two men were injured about a quarter of a mile further south on the same highway in a one-car accident. Francisco Magalian, about 40, route 2, Nyssa, was hospitalized with a fractured ankle and collar bone. His condition was reported as satisfactory. Domingo Ybanez also was confined to Malheur Memorial hospital in good condition with possible chest injuries. State police said the car apparently left the highway as it was traveling north and traveled both on the ground and in the air for some 150 feet before coming to rest on the bank of a canal.

Sunday Accident Shortly before midnight Sunday a station wagon-truck accident at the Apple Valley junction just east of the Nyssa bridge hospitalized Harvey Nance, about 46, Jerome, with fractures and lacerations. His condition was still reported as critical by hospital authorities yesterday. A passenger in Nance's car, W. O. Brannon, Parma, was treated at Nyssa's hospital for lacerations of the scalp and released. Nance's car struck the bed of a truck driven by Dellis Wood, Nyssa, coming onto the highway from the Apple Valley road. Wood's three and six-year-old children who were riding with him were checked at Malheur Memorial hospital and released.

Search for Drowning Victims Draws Large Crowd



RESCUERS AND SPECTATORS rushed to the banks of the Snake river at Nyssa last Wednesday when a boating mishap took the lives of two Boise men. On the left the first of two boats began dragging operations for the bodies of Earl Allen, age 46, a Boise contractor, and Gerald E. Zimmerman, 36, an associate of Allen's under the direction of Nyssa fire chief Ralph Lawrence. The boat on the right is manned by Robert Bement of Caldwell who was credited with saving the life of

one of the two men who escaped from the accident—Tom Doyle. Doyle went under water when the boat turned over and Bement dived for him, brought him to the surface and placed a life jacket on him, pulled him to shore and applied artificial respiration ashore several hundred feet downstream from the Nyssa bridge. The Caldwell man then attempted to dive for the two drowning victims, but was unable to locate them. The fourth man, Mike Cahoon, was

able to swim ashore without aid. The Boise men's boat overturned about 4 p.m. and as the search for the two bodies dragged on a large crowd of onlookers and volunteers gathered at the cars in the foreground and spectators on the bridge in the right photo illustrate. Speed Porter and Ray Harmon, aided by Beverly Browning of Twin Falls, served as skin divers in an effort to locate the bodies before they were located with grappling hooks about 7 p.m. —Journal Photo.

Annual All-Star Eastern-Central Baker Game Set

The annual Elks' All-Star football game is set for Saturday, Aug. 23, with eastern Oregon going against central Oregon in Baker at the high school stadium. The proceeds of this game go to the Elks' Portland eye clinic each year, and last year about \$1700 was raised from the All-Star game to help carry on the work done there. Bill Whyman, Elks' publicity chairman for the annual sporting affair, says the major phase of the Elks' eye program continues to be comprised of medical and surgical services to children from low income families. From the start of the program in July, 1949, to May, 1956, 5,200 individual children received care in the Portland clinic. They made a total of 28,709 visits to the Portland clinic. They made a total of 28,709 visits to the medical center, with nearly 600 children having major eye surgery, or nearly one out of every nine children admitted to the clinic. Two hundred forty-four operations were performed to straighten the eyes, 25 children had cataract operations, 32 operations were performed to control glaucoma (increased pressure of the eyes), seven operations were performed to remove tumors in or around the eye and six operations were performed to clear opacities of the cornea. Three of the operations involved transplantation of corneas removed from the eyes of individuals who had willed them at death or had to have an eye removed for some other reason. County Welfare Administrator Chosen

(Continued from Page 1) \$303.61 for 8 children in foster care. A total of 465 applications for financial aid were processed by the department during the fiscal period and 303 were approved for payment. A total of 474 cases were closed or denied. Approximately 9.3 percent of all persons aided received assistance for less than a year. OAA Declines The old age assistance program showed the only decline in total number of cases by 18 per month, but an increase in aid to the permanently and totally disabled cases offset half of this change. The average yearly cost per case for all assistance families increased only \$34 to approximately \$1,045. At least one-third of the cases also had additional income, usually social security or other earned benefits to supplement their public aid. More Medical Care The total increase in public aid was more than accounted for by a greater requirement for medical care which is provided on a supplemental basis for eligible recipients. Expenses for medical services paid directly to vendors increased \$16,739 over the previous year and comprised \$94,928.10 of the total expenditures. This figure does not include the first \$55 charged for each nursing home patient every month at a total cost of \$27,115 for the year. Besides nursing home care, other expenses paid for recipients were hospital costs, doctor fees and medications. "We feel that it is quite apparent from an analysis of these figures that although the need for public aid is changing from a requirement for food, shelter and clothing to one for medical care and other personal services, it is encouraging to note that the local agency has been increasing its non-financial activities in an earnest effort to provide a total social welfare program designed to meet the requirements of Malheur county citizens," Myrick commented.

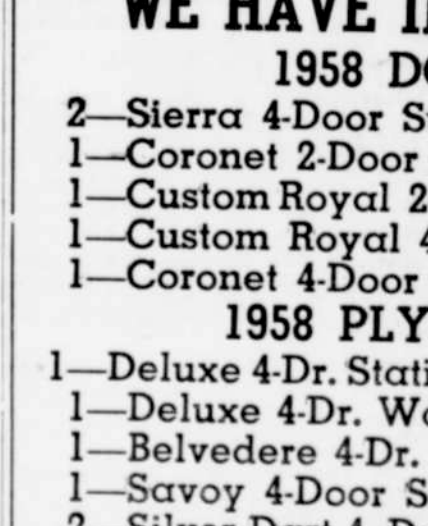

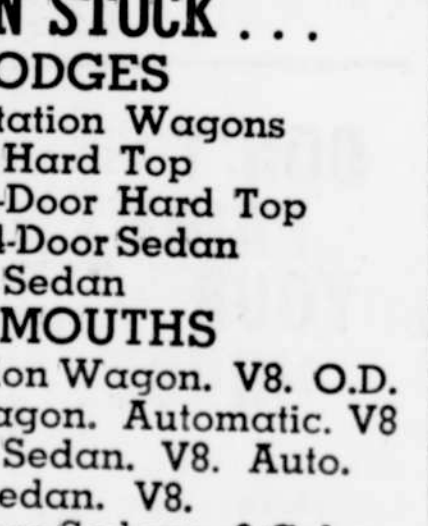
