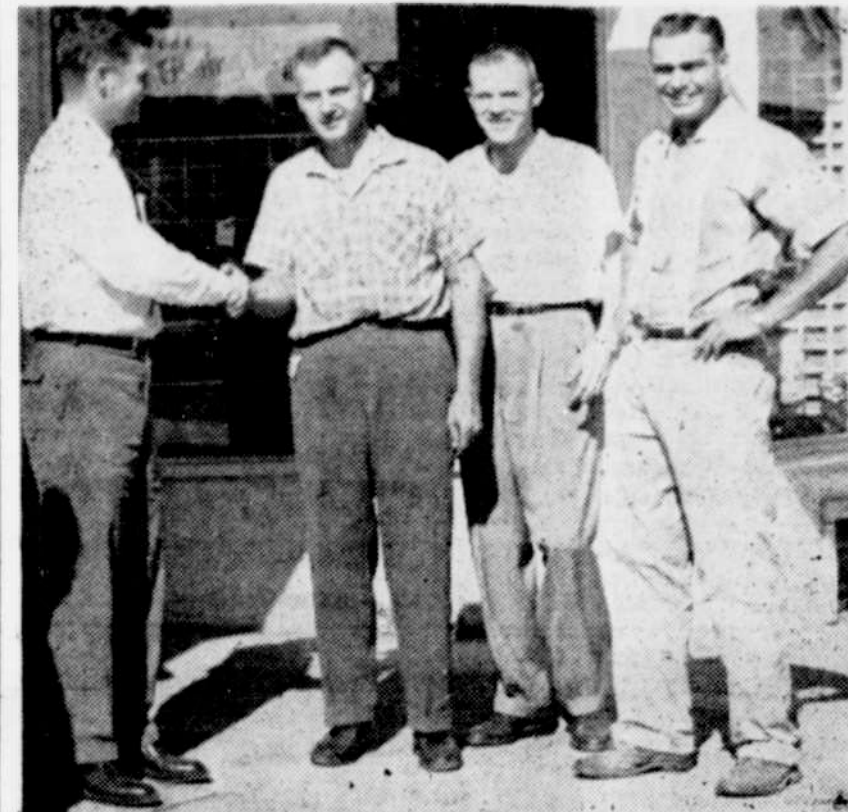

Eagles Auxiliary Counts

The local Eagles auxiliary agreed to do all the counting for the city under Mrs. Eddie Taylor as census director. They completed the enumeration by the end of July. Since that time the city has been verifying and certifying the census before submitting it to the state board of census.

Nyssa's population count was 2,525 in the federal census of 1950. Based on estimates submitted by the city for the past two years, the state census board had certified population figures of 2,772 for 1956 and 2,830 in 1957.

This year's decrease was credited to errors in the two previous estimates rather than an actual decline in Nyssa's population since the population had shown an increase over the last actual count in 1950.

Two Men Jailed Over Old, Unpaid JP Court Fines

Two ex-Nyssa residents found themselves in trouble in Don M. Graham's justice court this week over driving offenses committed several years ago. Both also faced a current charge before Graham.

Walter Livingston appeared before Judge Graham Saturday charged with failure to signal for a turn and was fined \$5.50 plus \$4.50 costs. However, court records revealed that on July 8, 1953, Livingston had been fined a total of \$37 by Graham for reckless driving and no driver's license and given until July of the same year to pay the fines.

After Livingston reportedly left Nyssa and did not pay the fine a bench warrant was issued for his arrest Sept. 17, 1953. Saturday that warrant was served and Livingston was committed to the Malheur county jail by Graham for 22½ days in lieu of the \$37.

Edward L. Brooks found himself in similar circumstances in Graham's court Saturday, also, when he appeared charged with failure to stop and yield the right of way. Brooks asked for a trial by a justice court and was placed on \$100 bail.

Improper Garbage Disposal Noted

Nyssa's Police Chief Lee Hansen said this week his department has noted a recent relaxing on the proper containing of garbage throughout the city, in violation of city ordinance.

Hansen urged citizens to see that garbage is contained in a metal, leakproof can with a fly-tight cover, as prescribed by city law.

Improper containing of garbage spilled outside of the can, particularly this time of year, draws flies, the chief said, not only to the premises, but to the entire city.

Violation of the city ordinance on properly containing garbage is classified as a misdemeanor and punishable by fine.
