

### More Permits Than Applications Mean Unit Deer Hunt Permits Still Available Throughout This Area

Hopeful deer hunters in this area interested in unit deer hunts fared far better this week than hunters in many other areas of the state as the Oregon State Game commission announced that there were more permits than applications in the Baker-Sumptner, Beulah, Malheur river and Owyhee units.

The commission said that hunters who would still like to apply for a unit hunt, even those unsuccessful in drawings for another unit, may file for one of the unfilled units. Deadline for filing has been set for Sept. 15 and a second drawing scheduled, if necessary, for Sept. 22.

Some 475 of the original 1400 permits in the Baker-Sumptner unit remain. Beulah unit still has 1,617 of its 2500 permits remaining. Malheur river unit has 1,792 permits left from 3000 and Owyhee has 408 left from 500.

At the same time the commission said some 900 applications for controlled or unit deer and elk areas had to be discarded because hunters had failed to fill out their applications according to the instructions on the back of each application blank.

The game commission advised Oregon nimrods that copies of the 1958 hunting regulations are now available at all license agents throughout the state, with some 300,000 copies of the rule book printed this year.

Waterfowl and trapping regulations will be published in separate leaflets, the commission said, and should be available about the middle of September.

With the publication of the 1958 laws, the commission reminded parents of young hunters that all hunters, regardless of age, are required to have in possession a regular hunting license and appropriate tags to hunt big game animals.

Incidentally, Oregon deer hunters will be asked this fall to aid in one of the most comprehensive big game studies ever conducted by the Oregon Game commission. The commission will ask hunters' help in an intensive study of the Silver lake deer herd, including the evaluation of harvest methods in terms of influence on game populations and recreational values. All hunters will be required to check in and out of the Silver lake management area throughout the season.

### Nyssa Man Fined In Justice Court For Hit and Run

Cristobal Apodoca, 19, Nyssa, was found guilty of hit and run in Don Graham's Nyssa justice court Tuesday and fined \$100 plus \$4.50 court costs.

Apodoca was charged with failing to stop and notify the owner of a motor vehicle after a collision with a 1958 automobile owned by Ray Drown, Nyssa, on Saturday. Justice court records listed Edward Larson, Nyssa, as a witness to the accident.

Judge Graham suspended \$50 of Apodoca's fine providing he pay \$50 to cover the damages to Drown's car.
