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## PO Sets Dates For Overseas Christmas Mail

The period of Nov. 1 to Nov. 20 has been designated for the mailing of Christmas parcels to members of the Armed Forces overseas, according to an announcement by Nyssa Postmaster Lloyd Lewis this week.

This includes, Lewis said, personnel of all Armed Forces, members of their families and authorized civilian employees overseas that receive their mail through an A.P.O. or Navy Post Office.

The Nov. 1 to 20 dates are the specified time for mailing of surface Christmas parcels, Dec. 1 to Dec. 10 has been set for air mail parcels.

Lewis said the standard maximum weight for such shipments is 70 pounds and the parcels must be limited to 100 inches in length and girth combined.

Christmas cards should also be mailed within the designated periods for parcels, the announcement said, to reach the addressee by Christmas.

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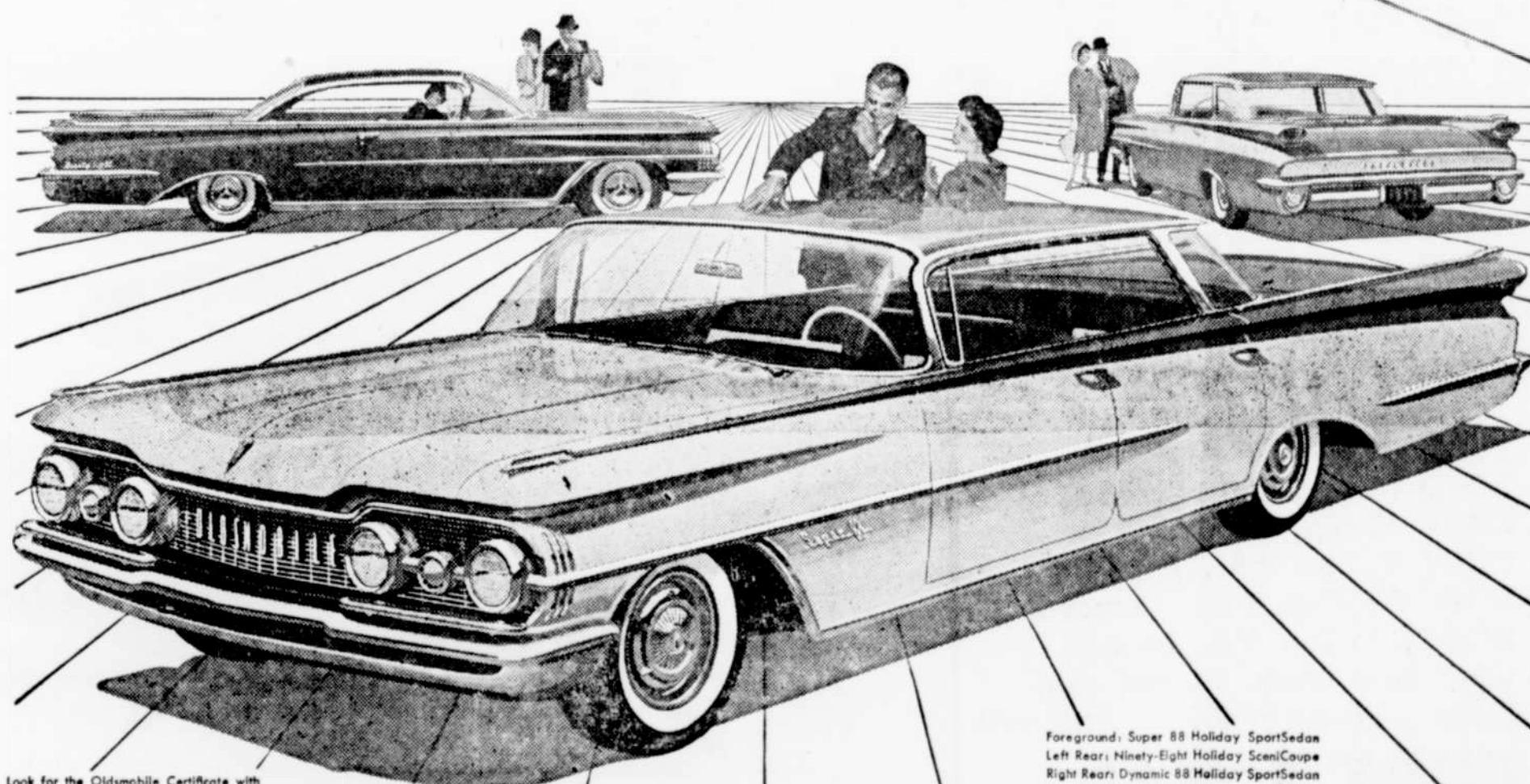
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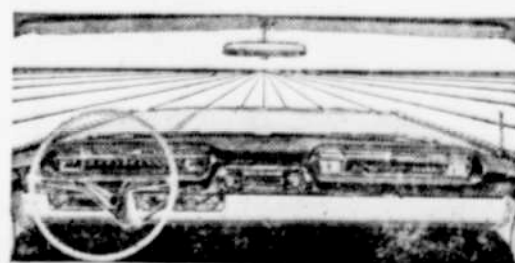
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
