

Deposits, Loans Again Increase At Nyssa Bank

Financial stability of the Nyssa community is again reflected in the First National bank quarterly statement, which in several previous reports has shown increases in both deposits and loans over the same quarters of previous years.

According to Leonard Hewett, Nyssa branch manager, deposits here on Sept. 24 were \$4,284,143 and a year ago at the same time they were \$4,230,353. The same date this year loans were \$2,896,494 as compared to loans of \$2,494,288 at the same time in 1957.

On a statewide basis, C. B. Stephenson, president, reported a \$10,588,154 increase in deposits and a decrease of \$5,381,377 in loans since the Oct. 11, 1957 bank call.

Total deposits recorded at the 78 offices were \$800,948,941 and loans amounting to \$405,219,945.

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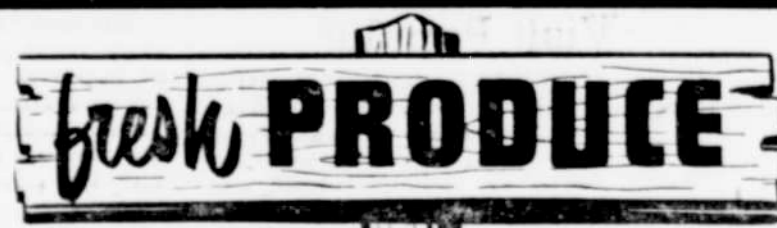
