

Bulldogs Head Off Payette Pirates By 20-7 Margin as Team Effort Pays Off; Rookstool Leads Squad

Nyssa's Bulldogs, playing as a team for the first time this season, hammered out a 20 to 7 triumph over Payette's Pirates Friday night on the east side of the river, with fullback-tackle Ron Rookstool playing a large part in the victory.

Rookstool, who's playing in his back position for the first time this year as a senior, really came through for the Bulldogs. Offensively he gained a minimum of three yards every time he charged the line and many times he plunged through for much more yardage. What's more he was blocking hard and true for the other Bulldog ball carriers. Defensively he was tackling hard and breaking up Pirate plays before they got started.

It's no small wonder why after the Pirate game Coach Bob Morford predicts Rookstool could develop into one of the best backs in the SRV-A league.

Payette failed to score until the closing seconds of the game after Coach Morford had cleared his bench. It was apparent that, for the first time this season, the Bulldogs were inspired with the desire to win and were playing as a single unit, rather than as individuals.

Nyssa scored their first touchdown just before the end of the first half on a 30 yard pass play from back Dave Sewright to Leroy Morris in the end zone.

In the third quarter, Rookstool carried the ball across on a five yard plunge for the Bulldog's second touchdown and then ran back across the goal line for the extra point.

Early in the final period of play, half back Don Walker skirted right end for better than 15 yards with Rookstool making the key block that broke him loose. Then Rookstool carried the ball to plunge for the final few yards for Nyssa's third TD of the game. He missed his final try for the point after touchdown.

This week Coach Morford was working of the Bulldog's secondary blocking and tackling, which was by far the weakest link on the squad against Payette, in preparation for a tough game in Ontario tomorrow night.

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Upland Bird Season Opens With Many Bangs

Shotgun hunters came into their own at 8:00 a.m. Saturday, as the upland game bird season got underway in full swing and the waterfowl season opened for a 95-day run. The season will run through Nov. 16 for upland birds and through Jan. 13 for waterfowl.

And the birds are there. Reports from game commission biologists throughout the state indicate this year will be one of the best for upland bird gunners in a long time, and the waterfowl populations in the Pacific flyways also show a gain from last year.

The hunters are here, too, according to all reports with nearly all available accommodations in the Nyssa-Vale-Ontario areas filled with hunters from outside the area. Motels and trailer parks were full for the opening of the season, and several groups of camps were also reported.

Plenty of birds were reported in the area for the opening days of the season with many hunters bringing in limit bags. There also were many reports of little luck in the opening days without the use of dogs due to the reluctance of many of the birds to fly.

The bulk of the upland bird shooting will probably take place throughout the season east of the mountains on agricultural lands stretching from the Klamath and Deschutes basins all the way to the Idaho border. Pheasants, quail, and partridges will be found in good numbers throughout these areas, according to the game commission, and hunters should find some good gunning almost anywhere these birds hang out.

Waterfowl gunners will have to depend primarily on local birds for their early shooting. A few migrants are dribbling into the state, but no real build-up has taken place with the exception of the Klamath-Tule lake area, where about five million birds are reported, mostly pintails.

There will be some good marshland shooting, the commission says, however, as the nesting population of waterfowl is high, especially in the major waterfowl areas. Warner, Summer Lake, Klamath, and other marshland areas should all produce good early shooting.

Nyssa Student Editor of W. U. Legal Handbook

Nyssa Gene Stunz, a senior law student at Willamette University in Salem, was appointed editor for the Willamette College of Law Legal Handbook this year, its last year of publication.

Stunz heads a staff of 13 for the Handbook, which was launched in 1946. Since it began publication, it has now run through the alphabet of legal cases and, after this year, will cease publication. This year's version will actually be a supplement to the 37 issues which have so far been issued over the dozen years.

The handbook consists of instructions given by the judge to juries during trials and the subsequent comment of the Oregon Supreme Court on the judge's instructions.

The Handbook, with a circulation of about 2500, has been issued on a quarterly basis and distributed free of charge to all lawyers in the state. The College of Law pays half of the expenses of the publication and the Oregon Bar bears the cost of the other half.

License Agencies Now Offering '58 Waterfowl Rules

Waterfowl gunners were advised by the game commission that the 1958 rules for the taking of ducks and geese are now available at all license agencies throughout the state. Oregon trappers were also advised that the rule books for furbearing animals are available at game commission offices.

For the second year the waterfowl synopsis contains a table showing the actual shooting time during the season. This shooting time table was compiled for the convenience of the hunter who in the past had to compute the proper time from sunrise and sunset tables.

On the public shooting grounds, the Malheur refuge will be open to gunners through Nov. 30, Warner Valley through Nov. 16, and Summer Lake throughout the entire season.

Antelopes Down Homedale 14 to 6 To Retain Lead in SRV-B League; Now Boast 4 Won, 1 Lost Record

Adrian's winning Antelopes came from behind in Homedale Friday afternoon to beat out the Trojans 14 to 6 and take firm hold on the SRV-B league's first place. Both teams entered the defensive battle with perfect 3-0 league records for this season.

With only two minutes left in the half, Adrian grabbed a Homedale fumble on the hometowners' 20 and, just seconds before the gun sounded, Kay Cleverly plunged over from the two yard line to tie the score. Phil Hatch then passed to end Jim Thompson for the extra point and the Antelopes led 7 to 6 at the half.

Midway in the third quarter, the Antelopes sustained a 60 yard drive with Hatch carrying the ball across from the one and Cleverly packing it across again for the extra point to give Adrian a 14 to 6 victory and a solid first place in league standings.

Thus far this season in league play, Cleverly has scored 50 points, Hatch has scored 45 and Stan Mills has totaled 25. The Antelopes have now won 4 and lost no league contests. They did drop a non-league game to Joseph the week before 13 to 7 for their only defeat of the season.

Tomorrow the Antelopes return to their home field to meet Halfway at 8 in the evening.
