Father Cletus Kirkpatrick, assistant of St. Bridget's Church in Nyssa, will show the sacred vessels and vestments used in religious worship.

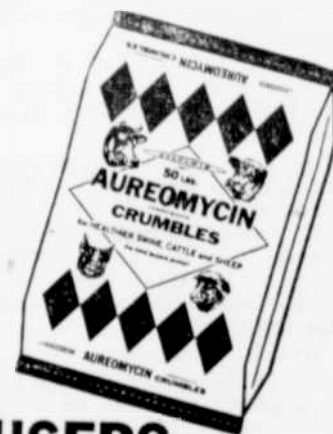
In charge of the refreshments will be Mrs. Glenn Brown and Mrs. John Dority.

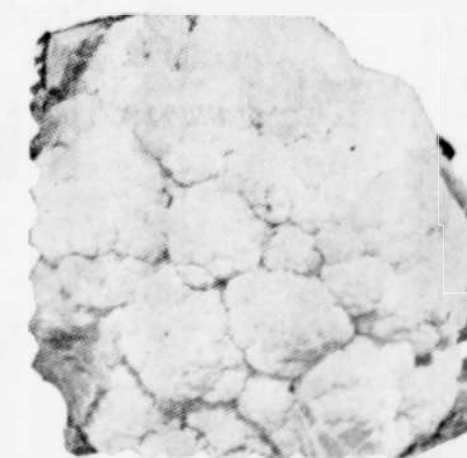
