

Malheur ASC Announces Committee Election; Slate of Nominees Listed

Chairman Lib Chastain of the Malheur ASC county committee has announced that the nominations for the forthcoming ASC community committee election for 1939 have been completed.

Each year community election boards, appointed by the county election board, select ten eligible nominees for the seven ASC communities.

The election will be held by mail again this year, Chairman Chastain said. Ballots will be mailed to each eligible voter by the ASC county office and Nov. 15 has been designated as the last date ballots can be postmarked. Each voter shall vote for five of the nominees in his respective community.

In addition to nominees selected by the community election boards, nominees may be placed on the ballot by petition. Petitions signed by 10 or more eligible voters favoring nominations of additional persons will be received by the community election boards prior to Oct. 27. The names of such eligible persons, so petitioned for, will be included in the slate of nominees.
