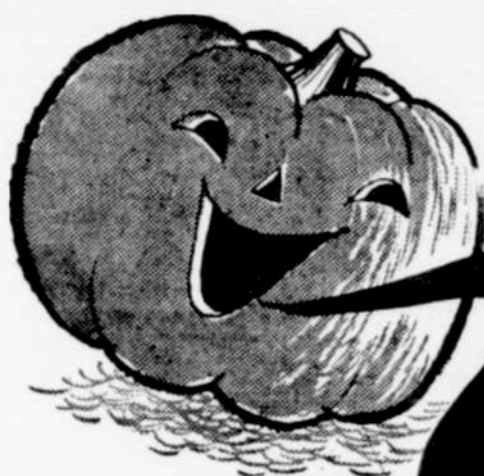
Cellophane, so widely used today, was first manufactured in 1924. Originally, it sold for \$2.65 a pound.
