Both boys came through for the Bulldogs when it counted.

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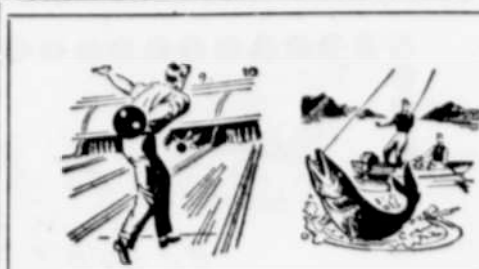

Adrian's Winning Antelopes Down Pointless Wilder Squad 48 to 0 To Retain League's First Place

Adrian's Antelopes, led by hard-charging Phil Hatch who scored 17 points and passed for 7 more, soundly trounced Wilder 48 to 0 Friday for their fifth SRV-B league win, against no losses, for the season.

The win virtually assured the Antelopes the league championship as they remained in undisputed first place with only Fruitland and Marsing to go. Adrian ran their season scoring to 230 points in the rout of Wilder, with their season's opponents managing only 19 points.

The Antelopes started their scoring off in the first quarter Friday night with a pass from Hatch to Jim Thompson that was good for 35 yards and a touchdown. The point-after attempt was missed.

In the second quarter Stanley Mills went off tackle for 25 yards to go over for the Antelopes' second TD, and Hatch passed to Thompson for the extra point.

Later in the same period, Fred Sayre intercepted a Wilder pass on the 45 yard line and returned it all the way for six more points. Hatch then successfully kicked for

the PAT. As the second half got underway, Hatch drove 10 yards for the fourth Adrian score and then kicked over the extra point. Still in the third period of play, Hatch repeated the same performance for seven more points.

In the fourth and final quarter Sayre connected on a pass with Alan Boatwright for six more points, and having found the combination, Sayre passed again in the same period, completing it to Boatwright once more for the final Antelope touchdown. Not to be outdone, Hatch successfully kicked both conversions to give the Antelopes a total of 48 points.

During the 60 minutes of play, Adrian piled up a total of 18 first downs while Wilder could squeeze out only two.

The Antelopes now meet Fruitland tomorrow night on the Idahoans' field and return to Adrian against Marsing for their final contest of the season Nov. 7.

Their season's record now stands at six won and one lost, with their single defeat coming in a non-league contest with Joseph.

Boys Attend FFA Convention In Kansas City

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Nyssa's Bulldogs Drop 32 to 20 Contest to Parma's Panthers In Spite of Fourth Quarter Rally

Nyssa's Bulldogs fought back hard in the final quarter of Friday night's game with Parma here, but they couldn't overcome their first half deficit and dropped the game to the Panthers 32 to 20.

The Bulldogs, obviously missing the offensive punch and the defensive firmness of injured Ron Rookstool, who played only two minutes, gave way before an inspired, charging Parma line during the first half of the game as the Panthers ran up 25 points and held the Bulldogs scoreless.

Parma ran the opening kickoff back 30 yards, hit with a pass play and followed with a two-yard plunge to rackup their first 6 points in the opening minutes of the game. After Nyssa fumbled Parma's kickoff the Panthers recovered and it took them only two more plays to make the score 12 to 0.

Twice more in the second period the Panthers sustained long drives, after forcing the Bulldogs to kick, and hammered across for touchdowns. It took four tries, however, for the Panthers to score their first point-after-touchdown.

In the second half Bulldog Frank Walker went all the way on a pass from Dave Sewright

only to be called back by an off-side penalty. By holding the Nyssa squad after the penalty, the Panthers turned these five yards into a touchdown drive and followed with the extra point to make the score 32-0.

Before the quarter ended, Sewright cut loose with another pass, this time to Jim Savage, for a touchdown that counted. Savage then scored the extra point.

Picking up some drive, the Bulldogs scored their second TD as the final quarter got underway on another Sewright to Savage pass, but they missed the PAT.

After taking over on downs, the Bulldogs broke Clark Jaques loose for an 80 yard touchdown run for their final 6 points and Jaques carried for the extra one that made the final score 32 to 20.

Tomorrow night the Bulldogs travel to Emmett for their final game of the season against a team that has been improving in recent weeks. Coach Bob Morford says that Rookstool should be able to start tomorrow night, but first string tackle Ken Ashby, who missed the Parma game because of a shoulder injury received in practice, will not be able to play.
