

Second Man Hurt By Corn Picker

The second Nyssa area man within a week was injured by a corn picker last Thursday when Ray Callahan, 28, route 2, had his right hand caught in the mechanism of one of the machines.

Malheur Memorial hospital officials said Callahan was treated for the hand injuries he received about 11:30 Thursday morning

and was released.

The Friday before R. A. Clayton of the Buena Vista community received similar injuries when he caught his arm in a corn picker he was operating on his farm. Clayton, however, was hospitalized for nearly a week with his injuries.

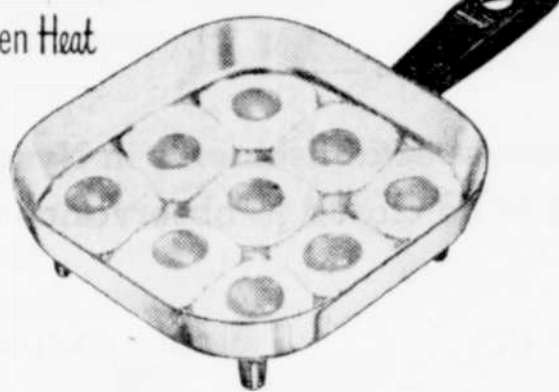

The intermediate divisions—Teen Wise Miss, and Clothes for Fun and Sun—will get their innings at the second series, and the advanced divisions will be worked on at the last group.

day so older girls may attend; the other meetings will be primarily for the 4-H leaders.

Janet Lohrenz will spend several days at a state-wide agent's training session to get all the latest dope on the 4-H clothing project. This information will serve as the basis for the county discussions.

Malheur Agent's Work Honored By Farm Bureau

Malheur County Agent Harry R. Sandquist was nominated last week for the Oregon Farm Bureau's distinguished service award by the County Farm Bureau, the first nomination from this region in several years.

Nominations for the award are judged on contributions to furthering Oregon agriculture and go to those who have "shown an unselfish desire to advance agriculture and farm progress in the state."

Four major fields of work were cited with Sandquist's nomination "work with rural youth, improvement in agricultural production and marketing, assistance in home economics problems and service to community organizations."

Sandquist has been county agricultural agent in Malheur county since November of 1945. He came here from Lakeview where he served as manager of the local irrigation project for seven years after his graduation from Oregon State college in 1938.

Achievements cited in the nomination included the fact that the 4-H movement has increased from 767 members to 1101 members since Sandquist came to the county and the fact that Sandquist arranged for and cooperated in a series of over 80 field trials between 1950 and 1953 to get actual information on five major crops under application of different kinds and amounts of fertilizer.

The Oregon award winner will be named Nov. 12 during the Farm Bureau's annual state meeting in Salem.

Send Christmas Mail Overseas In November

Postmaster Lloyd Lewis announced today that the period between Nov. 1 and Nov. 20, 1958 has been designated for the mailing of Christmas parcels, Christmas cards and letters to members of our Armed Forces overseas.

The postmaster explained that the term "Armed Forces overseas" includes personnel of the Armed Forces, members of their families, and authorized United States civilians employed overseas who receive their mail through an APO number.

Lewis pointed out that boxes should contain sufficient cushioning material so that the contents will be tightly packed to prevent any rattling or loosening of articles within the package. A slip showing list of contents and addressee should be enclosed in every box or package.

There are some prohibitive articles that cannot be sent overseas, Lewis said, including matches and lighter fluid. Cigarettes, other tobacco products, and coffee are prohibited in parcels addressed to certain military post offices, he added.

The Postmaster urged everyone to be sure addresses are legible and complete, and they should always be clearly written, or better yet, typewritten.

Overseas parcels and Christmas cards going by surface mails can be sent between Nov. 1 and Nov. 20. Cards and letters going by Air Mail should be sent between Dec. 1 and Dec. 10.

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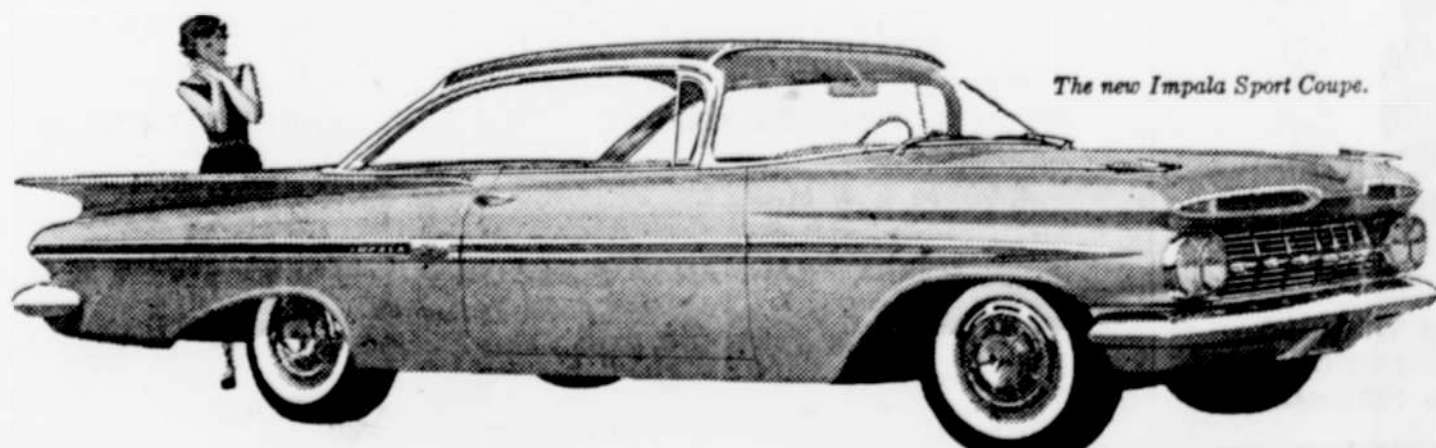
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
