Adrian's Winning Antelopes Now Near League Title With 60-18 Win Over Fruitland Grizzlies Friday

Adrian's winning Antelopes soundly trounced Fruitland's Grizzlies Friday night on the Idahoan's home field by the lopsided score of 60 to 18, statistically, assure them of at least a tie for the SRV-B league title, but, actually, set them rather firmly in that spot.

The win over Fruitland gives the Antelopes a six won, none lost league record, with only Marsing left to play tomorrow night in Adrian. Homeade has finished their league play with a 6-1 record, so if the Antelopes should lose to Marsing they would be in a tie with Homeade and they have previously defeated Homeade in league play.

Adrian started off strong against the Grizzlies Friday night with Kay Cleverly plunging over from the five-yard line early in the quarter and then repeating the performance from two yards out later in the period. Adrian's first extra point was scored after the second TD on a pass from Phil Hatch to Jim Thompson.

Early in the second quarter Hatch broke through the middle of the Fruitland line, raced 40 yards for six more points and then kicked the point after touchdown. Ben Zamora continued Adrian's scoring ways in the second period as he grabbed a blocked Fruitland pass and scooted 20 yards over the goal line.

Adrian Leads at Half Just before the end of the first half, Don Costley drove for 10 yards and another Antelope score with Fred Sayre passing to Allen Boatwright for the PAT. The half ended with Adrian leading 32 to 0.

Fruitland almost held their own in the third quarter, scoring their first 12 points while the Antelopes were running up 13 more. Hatch stretched his second-quarter run by racing 65 yards for one Adrian TD, and Stanley Mills pounded out six yards for six more Adrian points. Hatch came back and kicked the extra point. Fruitland started their scoring with Adrian replacements flooding the field on a 25-yard pass play. Later in the third period they added six more points on a one-yard plunge. Both PAT tries failed.

80-Yard Fruitland Run Not to be outdone, Hatch led the Antelopes to two more TDs in the final 15 minutes of play while the Grizzlies were adding six points. Hatch first broke up the middle again and went 60 yards to score, kicking the extra point, and later broke away for a 65-yard touchdown run, once again kicking the PAT.

The Grizzlies were credited with the longest TD run, however, when they broke away in the final period of play for an 80-yard scoring run and their final six points of the game.

Friday's win gave the Antelope's a seven won, one lost season's record.

Nyssa's Bulldogs Down Emmett's Huskies 28 to 18 in Final Game; Post Three Won, Five Lost for Season

Nyssa's Bulldogs wound up their football season in what it appears will develop into a three way tie for fourth place in the Snake River Valley's "A" league with a 28 to 18 victory over the Emmett Huskies Friday night.

The Bulldogs looked good in their last game of the season, particularly in the second half, and coach Bob Morford played every player on the Nyssa bench. However they led only 7 to 6 at halftime and an inspired Emmett squad drew first blood in the game.

In the first period Emmett, with Nyssa's linebacker playing back, broke loose over guard and streaked 61 yards for the game's first TD. In the second quarter, Bulldog Ron Rookstool finished up a Nyssa drive by plunging inches for a touchdown and then added the extra point to give the Bulldogs a one-point lead.

Second Half Good After a halftime understanding, the Bulldogs came back onto the field looking and acting like a new team as Don Walker scored first from seven yards out and Clark Jaques added the PAT. Still in the same quarter, Rookstool plunged over again, this time from three yards out, and he again added the extra point to give Nyssa a 21 to 6 lead as the third period ended.

Emmett countered in the final quarter against a raft of Nyssa substitutes with a revenge play and a 32 yard run for a touchdown, but they failed to make the PAT.

Walker Breaks Loose Not to be outdone, Bulldog Walker started around right end, faced too much opposition, reversed his field to the weak side, and broke loose for a 74 yard TD run. Burton Smith threw one of the best Bulldog blocks of the season to break Walker loose for the final Nyssa TD. Frank Walker then passed to Jerry Myrick for the extra point.

With only seconds left in the game Emmett hit on a long pass play and went 70 yards for a TD, but again they failed on the extra point try.

Friday night's win gave the Bulldogs a three won, four lost season's league record. They also dropped a game to Mac High, outside SRV-A play.

Coach Praises Team Coach Morford, who finished his first season in Nyssa, commended the Bulldog squad on their second-half play Friday night. He said the Bulldogs' biggest difficulty all season has been inexperience, adding that his squad has played some good ball and also some bad ball throughout the season. Morford said the team lost some games they could have won and he felt the Bulldogs were outclassed only twice—against Vale and Mac High.

Morford thanked the townspeople for their support of the Bulldogs this season and he said he was hopeful of a better turnout of prospective football players next fall.
