burglar tools that would make any safe-cracker proud, trying vainly to chisel his way into the coin box of the pay phone. 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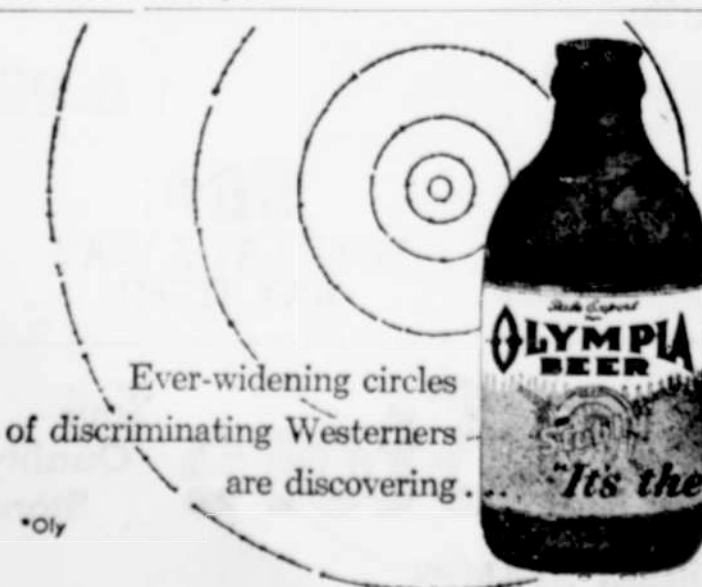


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
