

OSC Seed Potato Testing Slated For December

Oregon State College will make greenhouse tests of uncertified potatoes for interested growers beginning in late December, reports Turner Bond, county extension agent. Growers with seed to test, are asked to notify the county agent's office, city hall, Ontario by Nov. 24.

The greenhouse test of seed potatoes, Bond explains, involves growing plants from a 100 lb. sample of each lot in the greenhouses at Corvallis. Disease present in the seed lot is determined by a count of plants produced in the plot that shows virus disease symptoms.

Bond further noted that some common seed potato problems such as ring rot or infestation with nematode would not be revealed in the greenhouse test because of the short period of growth of about 6 weeks that is required to make the test.

To check for these problems, Bond asks growers to report the storage location of their seed lots rather than select their own samples for test. He plans to personally gather samples and make an extensive bin inspection for these problems at the time of sampling.

Growers requesting greenhouse testing of seed potatoes are charged a fee of \$15 per sample for the costs at the greenhouse plus costs of transporting samples from Ontario to Corvallis, Bond said.

Tests ordinarily begin in late December as greenhouse space becomes available after the testing of certified seed stops. With six week's growth period required for the testing, growers could expect to receive results of tests on their seed potatoes during the last half of February, Bond concluded.

Rebekah Lodge Hears NHS Choir

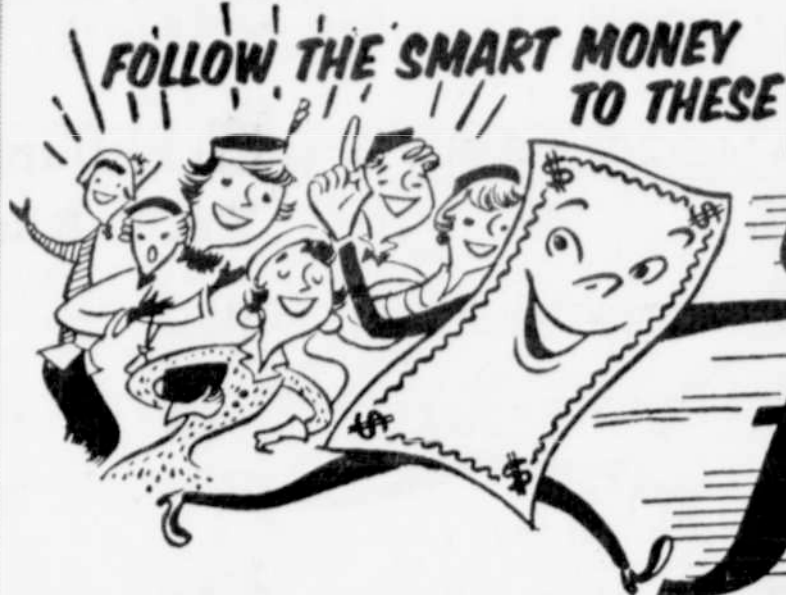
The Yellow Rose Rebekah lodge met Tuesday evening at the hall with 20 members present.

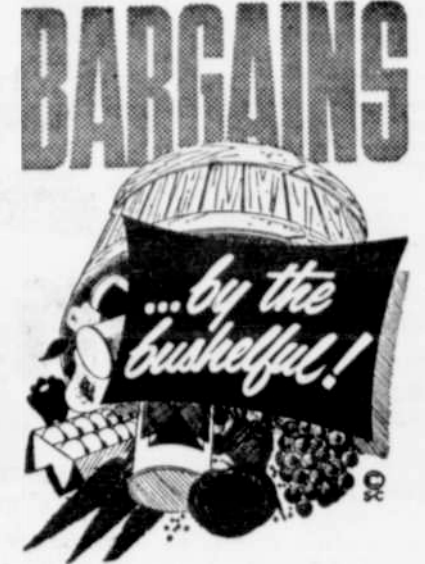
Nyssans to District Hairdressers Meet
