

County Library Publishes List Of New Volumes

History, in the form of a novel as well as non-fiction, heads the list of new books going into circulation Saturday, Nov. 8, at the Malheur county library.

July 4, 1776, by Donald Barr Chidsey is an hour by hour account of the events leading to the signing of the Declaration of Independence by the Continental Congress.

Jonathan Daniels in his *Prince of Carpenters* singles out Milton S. Littlefield for study as a representative of the carpenters who plagued the South in the days of Reconstruction.

The *Autobiography of the West* edited by Oscar Lewis is a delightful and rewarding tale of history, of fabulous adventure, comedy and tragedy. With its explanatory and unifying commentary it is a revealing eyewitness chronicle of life in the Old West.

Sycamore Men by David Taylor is a novel of the Revolution in the southern states and the legendary Francis Marion with his nondescript troops of South Carolina.

John E. Parsons, an eminent authority in the field of firearms history, presents the first documented account of the original cartridge revolvers made in America in his recent book called *Smith & Wesson Revolvers*.

Spacepower by Donald Cox describes the technical resources, the stages of experimental advance, the political and economic hazards, obstacles and advantages to space conquest.

Official Automobile Handbook edited by Charles N. Barnard gives some basic information, some helpful advice, some warnings and some tips about the automobile in your garage along with a little of the story of the motor car as an implement of work or of sport.

Defend Yourself by Jack Grover combines what he considers the best techniques of many forms of combat, ancient and modern, into an effective system of self-defense.

Ann MacGregor's Cookbook for Frozen Foods by Charlotte Adams gives recipes, manners, charts, thawing times and freezing tips and tricks which should prove helpful to the homemaker.

Keep Listening by Francis Warfield contains her life story as a woman who triumphed over a serious hearing deficiency.

All the Plants of the Bible by Winifred Walker contains 114 flowers, fruits and shrubs beautifully illustrated and precisely identified with full description of growing habits and uses, plus scriptural references and illuminating background lore.
