Fish Releases Reach New High; Federal Aid Due

October releases of large fingerling trout by the game commission pushed the poundage figure to an all-time high in hatchery fish production for a single year, according to the State Game Commission. Reino Koski, chief of fish liberations, said that at the end of October the poundage had reached a total of 715,000 pounds of fish released, which is a 36 per cent increase over last year's total released.

The heavy increase in poundage is almost entirely attributable to the game commission's large fingerling production program and the production of much larger legal sized fish than produced in the past. Although releases of large trout are viewed with favor by the angler, production of these fish is causing some concern because of fish food costs, the commission says.

Total fish production at all game commission hatcheries during 1958 should reach approximately 20 million, the second straight year that this goal has been reached.

Fish remaining to be released in '58 are mainly chinook and silver salmon.

At the same time the commission said Oregon's share in Federal Aid funds for the fiscal year under the Dingell-Johnson and Pittman-Robertson acts for fish and game restoration will amount to slightly more than one-half million dollars.

The apportionment for Oregon was \$512,146 which is about \$12,000 less than was received for the program last year. Of the one-half million, slightly more than \$103,000 is available for fish restoration programs and just over \$409,000 for game restoration.

Money for the Federal Aid program is derived from an 11 per cent excise tax on sporting arms and ammunition and a 10 per cent excise tax on fishing tackle. Excise taxes apportioned to the 48 states and territories amounted to about \$21,000,000 this year.

Adrian's Antelopes swept to an undefeated SRV-B league record and undisputed first place in the league with a resounding 55 to 0 win over the Marsing Huskies in their last game—the season Friday night. This was the Antelopes' first league title since 1951, although they placed second last year.

At the same time senior half-back Phil Hatch racked up 25 points on three touchdowns and seven conversions Friday night to take the league's individual scoring title from Homedale's Laron Waite. Hatch totaled 122 points for the season. Adrian's Kay Cleverly also piled up 81 points during this year's play.

Playing at home, Hatch started things off with a bang for the Antelopes by running the kickoff back some 80 yards for a touchdown and then kicking the extra point.

Then, still in the first quarter, Hatch later drove off tackle, broke loose and tore 72 yards for another touchdown, once again kicking the extra point.

In the second period Adrian's Stanley Mills plunged for six yards and the Antelopes' third TD with Hatch scoring the point after for a 21 to 0 Adrian lead at halftime.

Adrian scored twice more in the third quarter—first with Cleverly plunging two yards, and later on a pass from Fred Sayre to Allen Boatright good for 10 yards. Both times Hatch kicked the extra point.

In the final period Hatch broke loose again as he returned a Marsing punt 45 yards for another Antelope TD, kicking the extra point once again. Cleverly then plunged another two yards for Adrian to score, followed by Hatch's kicking of his seventh consecutive PAT.

Hatch passed to Thompson who went 20 yards for Adrian's final score, but his kick after the TD missed the goal posts.

The Huskies threatened the Antelopes only once and that was in the first quarter when they drove to the 4 yard line only to be denied by the determined Adrian squad.

Friday's win gave the Antelopes a seven win, none lost SRV-B league record, one better than second place Homedale whom they defeated earlier in the season. Adrian also played two non-league games during the season, downing Halfway but dropping their only game of the year to Joseph.

During these nine games, Coach Glenn Ward's Antelopes ran up an impressive total of 345 points to a total of only 37 for their opponents.
