Dear Editor:

As might be expected with this or any other political battle . . . once over all is soon forgotten! Promise upon promise were dangled before the voter with but one purpose in mind, election!

One issue was clearly marked and the people not only in Oregon but across the United States responded in like fashion in declaring themselves. We, as tax payers, registered a protest in working approximately one third of our time for the man in the striped suit, Uncle Sam. Some of us resent trying to buy foreign friendship (at increased indebtedness to us while these same governments reduce their debts), we resent subsidy programs, pressure groups and fancy dressed up spending programs which plunge us deeper and deeper into a quagmire of debt. We are disturbed with the trend and with anxiety are reminded (Harper's Magazine November 1958) of the inflationary ladder which eventually destroyed "the Russia of the Czars, pre-Hitler Germany and the French Republic and half a dozen lesser governments".

It would seem safe to assume that both Democrats and Republicans voted for men pledged to economy in government. Will we in the months ahead remind these public servants of our tax dollar pleasures or . . . as so frequently in the past just complain over the back yard fences? We all like to live in a climate of prosperity. It is hoped that we recognize socialistic trends for what they are: heavier tax weights around our necks and greater public indebtedness.

Those of us who worked for some of the winning Republicans are indeed happy with the election outcome. We sponsored these candidates because of a firm conviction that they represented the best on the ballot. We greatly appreciated the generous contributions and loyal services of those who worked in this past campaign. We take this means of thanking you! And, to those who went to the polls, may we urge your continued interest in good government through expressed opinions to those we have chosen to serve us.
