Good Turnout Highlights Opening Of Nyssa Bulldogs' Basketball Season; Five Lettermen Return

District 7-A-2
Sports Schedule
Set Until 1962

The scheduling of high school sports events in the Oregon state 7-A-2 district, which includes Nyssa and Vale, will remain the same as it has been in recent years until the 1962-63 season, if no more schools are added to or taken away from the district before then.

This was unanimous decision of all the schools in the district at last Monday's meeting in Burns to finalize the athletic schedules for spring and the 1959 football season. Superintendent of Schools Walter McPartland and high school principal Jack Jenkins represented Nyssa at the meeting.

Other schools in the district include Mac high, Elgin and Enterprise.

Some 15 varsity and 30 Fresh-Soph Bulldog basketball players turned out for coach Harry McGinley's team last week as Nyssa's preparation for basketball got underway.

Five of the 15 out for the varsity squad—Gary Toomb, Dave Sewright, Jerry Myrick, Jack Meyers and Clark Jaques—are returning lettermen, and early practices indicate that McGinley's squad will be fast if not particularly tall.

McGinley qualified the Bulldogs' chances with a "it's pretty early to tell", but they looked pretty good in their early practice sessions. If they can sharpen up on their ball handling by the time their season begins, they shouldn't be handicapped much by their lack of height.

The Bulldogs begin season's play next weekend with a two-night against Burns there.
