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Nyssa Bulldogs Drop Two Opening SRV League Games, 46-33 to Vale, 42-37 to Payette; Parma Five Next

Nyssa's Bulldogs, who won two non SRV league games the week before, dropped their first league games of this season to Payette and Vale Friday and Saturday nights.

The Bulldogs lost out to Payette there Friday night 42 to 37 and Vale trounced them in the first Nyssa home game of the season Saturday night 46 to 33.

Friday night the Bulldogs started off strong and led Payette 10 to 8 at the end of the first quarter. They then maintained their lead for the next quarter as the half ended 21 to 18.

Shooting Fails

It was in the final half of the game the Nyssa team ran into difficulties as they went for 12 minutes without a field goal. Two free throws gave them 23 points at the end of the third period while Payette ran their score up to 35.

Starting the final quarter still unable to hit the basket, the Bulldogs finally broke loose with only three minutes left to play. In these closing minutes they pulled to within 5 points of Payette, but the scoring started a little too late for Nyssa and the game ended 42 to 37.

Meyers High Man

Center Jack Meyers led Nyssa's and the game's scoring with 10 points for the evening, all on field goals, followed closely by guard Jerry Myrick with 9. Dave Sewright scored 6 points, Gary

Toombs 5, Ron Rookstool 3, and Clark Jaques and Burton Smith each 2. LeRoy Morris, playing only part of the second half as guard, failed to score.

Saturday night the Bulldogs managed to tie Vale 6 to 6 at the end of the first quarter, but were never again able to overtake the Vikings. Vale had spread the margin to 26-17 by the half as Nyssa had difficulty finding the basket.

Shooting Improves

The Bulldogs could only scrape up two points in the third period for 19 as Vale ran their score up to 39. Then even though the Nyssa shooting improved in the final quarter, the Vikings widened the

margin to end the game 46 to 33.

Nyssa's Myrick led the scoring for the evening, however, with 14 points. The nearest Bulldog was Toombs with 6. Both Meyers and Jaques had 4 points, Sewright and Smith each had 2, and Rookstool had 1.

The Bulldogs now travel to Parma tomorrow night to meet a strong team that downed Ontario last weekend.

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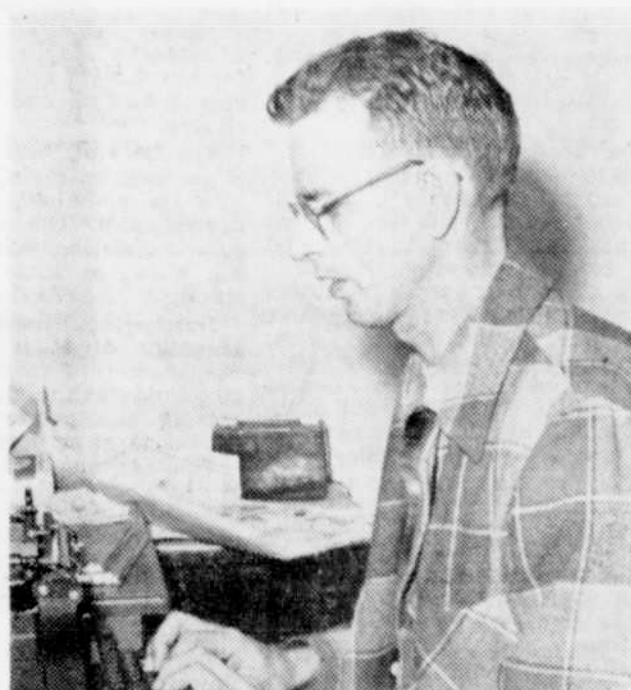

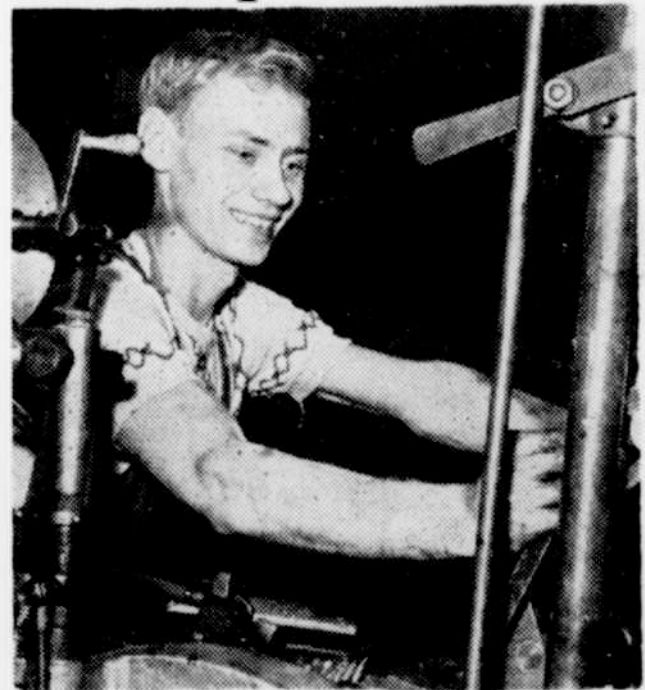
