A county budget of \$858,745 was approved by the county court. Gene Grasty, Nyssa, was appointed to the Malheur county public welfare commission by the governor. City council approved a final figure of \$162,777.25 for Nyssa's '58-'59 budget. Mrs. Clarice Poor was named principal of Nyssa's elementary schools.

Nyssa's 11th annual Nite Rodeo was termed a success with a record of 82 cowboys paying entry fees. Nyssa-Adrian contributed 226 pints of blood in their semi-annual drawing. Potato shipments soared 77 carloads ahead of early '57 shipments. Amalgamated Sugar company remodeled and expanded sections of their Nyssa plant, added a \$75,000 double unit piler. Nyssans were reminded of the nation-wide postal increase to 4-cents for First Class letters on Aug. 1.

Some 20 gambling warrants were served in Nyssa, Vale and Ontario as a result of a state police raid. Five "test" water meters were installed in Nyssa. Circuit Judge Matthew A. Biggs died at Burns. Malheur county Democratic central committee recommended Gov. Holmes appoint Clyde Snider, Nyssa attorney and Democratic candidate for state representative, to fill out his term. Roy Hiral of Nyssa was appointed to the Oregon Potato commission.

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acreage was 13,500 and yield 540,000 bushels.

Four crops, other than potatoes, that brought in less money were barley, \$518,000 in 1958 and \$646,000 in 1957; oats, \$138,000 and \$139,300; grain corn, \$672,000 and \$874,650; silage corn, \$960,000 and \$1,120,000. Acreage and yield were down in three of these crops, but corn silage acreage and yield was the same both years.

Miscellaneous crops, such as fruits, vegetables, hops and mints were estimated at the same value both years—\$1,000,000 from 8000 acres.

Burns Man Jailed After Guilty Plea To Assault Charge

A 50-year-old ranch worker from Burns entered a guilty plea to assaulting a 10-year-old Nyssa girl last Wednesday in Nyssa's justice court, after the court reduced the charge from "child molesting."

A complaint, signed by the girl's mother, charged the assault took place last Tuesday night in front of the Owyhee hotel where, it was charged, Norbert K. Clairmont forcibly attempted to get the girl and another youngster to accompany him around back of the hotel. Clairmont was arrested in the hotel by Nyssa police.

Judge Don Graham fined Clairmont \$50 plus \$4.50 costs and sentenced him to 30 days in the county jail. He is now serving 55 days in lieu of his fine.

Police records revealed Clairmont has a record of arrests dating back to 1932, with the last recorded in 1950 and none known to be for a similar charge.
