As we face the New Year we are like Abraham of old who "went out, not knowing where he was to go." From the human viewpoint the prospects may be bleak and fearful. Some who read this may be under a sentence of death and have no reasonable hope of outlasting the year. Others fear loss of job or health; all of us are aware of possibility of war and atomic destruction. The prophets of doom certainly have some basis for their pessimism. Let us embark upon the New Year with that spiritual quality, FAITH, attributed to Father Abraham. "By faith he sojourned in the land of promise." Faith makes the difference between despair and hope, for it reminds us that God is infinite and beyond history yet is working in time and is the Lord of history.
