

Area Progress for Second Half Of 1958 Illustrated in News Recap

(Continued from Last Week)

August

School district 26-C and the City of Nyssa showed the greatest proportionate decrease of any taxing units in the county in mill levies as a result of new valuations. Potato growers approved new marketing standards in an attempt to stabilize declining potato market. Spud shipments remained high. Nyssa Chamber heard of development of the road, construction of a state park and beginning of construction of a new resort at Lake Owyhee.

City began sprinkling of seven miles of unpaved streets and residents in three sections of Nyssa paid for dust oiling of several blocks of streets. A seven-foot link fence, donated by John Stringer, was put up between Nyssa's high school lawn and the highway.

The city council received a petition for a dog-leash ordinance and drafted such an ordinance. Jeff D. Dorroh, Jr., Ontario attorney, was appointed circuit judge by Gov. Holmes. Two Boise men died in a Snake river boating accident at Nyssa. Russell Olson construction company was awarded a contract to seal coat 28 blocks of city streets.

City manager A. R. (Jack) Middaugh resigned effective Oct. 1 to go to San Mateo county, Calif. as assistant to the county manager. Adrian's Legion post was first in the state to reach their 1959 membership quota. The lives of Mrs. Kiyoe Hirai, 69, Nyssa, and Gary Nakamishi, 16, Seattle, were claimed in an auto accident between Nyssa and Adrian.

Republican candidate for governor, Mark Hatfield, appeared in Nyssa, Vale and Ontario. City council decided to refer the proposed dog-leash ordinance and a levy for its enforcement to the voters in November. County onion growers approved a cull disposal program. Actual count of Nyssa's population by the Eagles auxiliary for the city showed 2,652 people in the city. Fourth auto accident within a week in the Nyssa area hospitalized four Idaho youths.

A kids parade down Main street highlighted the Retail Merchants city-wide Back-to-School celebration. Records were broken at the county 4-H Union Fat Stock auction portion of the county fair. September

Two youths, John Bonomi, 18, Hermiston, and Donald Fountain, 19, Santa Rosa, Calif., were apprehended by Nyssa police after robbing the Shell Super Service at knife point. Potato shipments passed 1957 tonnage. Nyssa's school enrollment reached a new high of 1269. A gala Treasure Days promotion, with cash and a pony given away, was held by Nyssa merchants and brought crowds to Nyssa.

Burglars broke into four businesses in and near Nyssa but their take was very small. A district Eagles convention was held in Nyssa with over 300 attending. City police arrested and charged three people, all giving Nyssa addresses, with shoplifting and selling the goods in labor camps around the area.

Nyssa-Nampa beet growers made arrangements with the sugar company to set up testing of sugar content of all beets delivered to the Dole station in 1958. Veterans' groups were circulating petitions asking Nyssa, Adrian, Vale and Ontario merchants to close for Veterans Day. October

Seven-year-old Danny Coleman of Nyssa probably saved his own life when he remembered to lay down and roll out the flames on his clothing after he was accidentally doused with burning gasoline. He suffered severe burns. Annual sugar beet harvest started with a flood of deliveries. Nyssa Merchant's police was launched by Ed Alexander.

Local Lions netted \$150 from their annual Live sale. High school students Patricia McWilliams and Dennis Spitz were named semi-finalists in the National Merit Scholarship competition. Eight nominating petitions for four upcoming city council posts were filed just under the deadline.

Democratic hopefuls Gov. Robert Holmes and Rep. Al Ullman appeared in Malheur county. The OLCC suspended the licenses of five taverns in Nyssa and Vale for seven days as a result of the July State Police gambling raids. State Legion commander George Nelson made an official visit to Nyssa.

Nearly 2,000 Nyssa-Adrian school children viewed the Oregon Van of History while it visited Nyssa. The new St. Bridget's Catholic church was dedicated. The state board of census estimated Malheur county's population at 22,060 and confirmed Nyssa's census. City council received and considered 18 City Manager applications. County had 9,074 registered voters eligible for No-

vember election. Adrian's high school enrollment grew to 128, about 10 more than the previous year.

Final 1957 sugar beet payments of \$530,000 were mailed to growers, totaling \$8,000,000 for year. Sherman Dodson, 56-year-old Nyssan, died in a cigarette-caused fire in a cabin at the Rainbow Rooms. Some 35,000 tons of Malheur county surplus potatoes were stored for cattle feeding under U.S. diversion program. Marion T. Weatherford, Republican candidate for congressman paid a campaign visit to Nyssa.

Jake Fischer, Chet Sage and Leonard Hewett were elected members of the county Centennial corporation. Councilman candidate Don Graham withdrew from council race. A sugar beet weighing 33 pounds was dug on the Mark Hartley ranch.

County courthouse committee eliminated new jail and other incidentals from proposed courthouse plans and lopped \$139,623 from the cost. Eagles state president Bill Bigoni paid an official visit to Nyssa. Nyssa and Adrian children raised \$161.60 for underprivileged children in their Hal-loween trick or treat drive.

November
Kay Brendle, Kenneth Pond, Don Engstrom and Maylin Maxwell were elected to the city council. Jeff Dorroh was elected circuit judge. Ed Oakes was elected state representative. County voters agreed with the rest of the state in naming Mark Hatfield governor and Al Ullman congressman, with 71 percent of them going to the polls.

Forrest Huffman and Bob Pond received Eagle scouting awards. \$4,570,000 was sent area sugar beet growers as their initial payment on the 1958 crop. Paul House, North Board of Control manager, was elected director on the executive committee of the newly-formed Pacific Northwest Irrigation Account league. Nyssa school census showed 1,745 children between 4 and 19 residing in district 26-C, 19 more than in 1956.

Three Nyssa youths—Donald Winslow, 18, Gene DeRock, 16, and Royce Roberts, 16—hiked safely out of rough Owyhee lake country after their car had become stuck the night before and they had been the object of a widespread search. Bands, Veterans and National Guard units paraded in Nyssa, Adrian, Vale and Ontario in observance of Veterans Day.

Nyssa's first Turkey Derby was held with turkeys racing down Main street and then awarded to shoppers. Adrian's Antelopes swept undefeated to first place in SRV-B league football play. Malheur Home Telephone Co. announced plans for toll-free service within Malheur county for Nyssans, along with a rate increase.

Robert Wilson, Fred Bracken and Ralph Lawrence were elected president, vice president and secretary of Nyssa's Chamber of Commerce for 1959. Some \$1,780,000 more was mailed sugar beet growers for their 1958 crop. The year's yield reached a new record of 27.5 tons per acre average.

Nyssa's northbound school bus was ordered not to cross the railroad tracks on foggy mornings. A small infestation of rats was discovered near Nyssa along the Snake river.

Nyssa's newly-appointed city recorder-treasurer, Sidney Kelley, resigned because of a misunderstanding of duties involved. Ted Morgan was presented a certificate of appreciation by the Oregon Farm Bureau.

December
Malheur county's property taxes showed a 10.7% increase over the previous year to \$2,433,640. About 77.5% of them were paid in time to be eligible for a 3% rebate. Burglars drilled a safe in Eder's in Adrian and took \$345 in cash and a variety of merchandise. State highway department began work on Nyssa's Main street traffic light.

Ralph Lawrence was re-elected chief of Nyssa's Volunteer Fire department. Wilbur Atherton was re-elected to the board of directors of the Rural Fire Protection district. Mrs. Betty Wilt was named Nyssa city clerk.

Santa arrived in Nyssa by helicopter. William Carson, president of the Nyssa-Nampa beet growers, was elected chairman of the National Beet Growers' reduction. Cliff Fox was named president of the Owyhee Riding club. Wilmer Hipp was installed worthy master of the Masonic lodge at Nyssa. Three persons were arrested for larceny of a Nyssa store following the fast thinking of a local merchant and a chase by city police.

Nyssa's Jaycees set a Christmas lighting contest and a Call Santa program for the holiday season. School district 26-C named their budget board for 1959-60. Red Cross Blood drive was set again for Jan. 5. High school music de-
