

YOUR LEGISLATORS SPEAK . . .

Senator

This is my first report upon legislative activities, and an effort will be made to see that a current report is dispatched to the newspapers in my district once each week. And the very first thing I want to do is to thank these newspapers for providing me with this means of keeping the people of my district informed as to what transpires at the legislature. Without their help, it would be almost impossible to establish a communication which reaches so many people.

We are now located at 1563 Court Street, Salem. Our telephone number is EMpire 3-7322, and an invitation is extended to all of the people in my district to visit us at any time and also to telephone us concerning any criticism or suggestion you may have.

The primary purpose of a legislator is to fully and sincerely represent his constituents. However, a legislator cannot be constantly aware of the wishes of the people in his district unless he is in communication with them.

I feel that I was very fortunate in committee assignments. In addition to being the minority leader of the Republican party in the Senate, I was designated as the chairman of the Senate Committee on roads and highways. Also, I am a member of the following committees: taxation, judiciary, state and federal affairs and legislative counsel. Obviously these assignments will require a great deal of time and attention since they are important committees and the work which they perform affects the lives and welfare of the people.

Following the organization of the Senate on Jan. 12, the inauguration of the Governor proceeded without embarrassing incident. Of course, the dispute as to the proper claimant to the office of Secretary of State still exists. The Attorney General will file a complaint on either Jan. 16 or 17. The proceeding will be filed directly in the Supreme Court and it is anticipated that within ten days the Secretary of State dispute will be resolved.

The situation concerning the Secretary of State's office is bringing about serious inconveniences. One of the functions of the Secretary of State is to sign warrants which are presented to the State Treasurer for payment. The salaries of many state employees as well as the legislature and other expenses are paid in this manner. The State Treasurer has taken the position that until the Supreme Court resolves the present dispute that no warrants will be honored. This, of course, will mean that many employees will not be paid at the regular time. Obviously a serious hardship will result since many of the recipients are depending upon the state paychecks for their livelihood. This problem has presented a dilemma which I feel should be resolved without partisanship or political designs. Toward this end, Rep. Elstrom and I prepared a request for an opinion from the Attorney General which we believe would solve the problem without prejudicing the respective claims of Howell Appling and David O'Hara, the two claimants to the Secretary of State's office. Our proposal was that each of these men designate Harold Philippe, a long time employee and expert in the accounting division of the Secretary of State's office, as a deputy of each. Mr.

Philippe could then sign the necessary warrants and the State Treasurer could honor the same because without question either Mr. Appling or Mr. O'Hara will be designated as the Secretary of State. Our request to the Attorney General asked for an opinion as to the validity of this proposal. He was hesitant to give us a reply but his staff is presently studying the matter and we expect an answer this week. This will at least serve to avoid any hardship among the employees of the state, should Mr. Thornton, the attorney general, consent.

The message of Governor Hatfield to the joint assembly contained many proposals concerning the state reorganization and his advice relative to various state problems. However, the greatest emphasis was placed upon the necessity of the State of Oregon to live within its means. He took the parallel of the early pioneer who while loading his wagon was forced to decide whether particular items were merely desirable or necessary. If only desirable, the items were not loaded. It is Gov. Hatfield's desire to have the State adopt the same philosophy.

It is apparent, however, that the greatest problem facing this State Legislature will be that of taxation and state services. In the event the people demand greater state services, there will subsequently be no alternative to an increase in taxes.

Dr. John Sly, an expert hired by the Holmes' administration at a cost of \$35,000, recommended that every single wage earner, regardless of the amount of his income, be required to share, at least to a small extent, in the costs of state government. Gov. Hatfield apparently believes that there is merit to a plan which requires every wage earner to make some contribution to the cost of government. He has asked

the legislature to give this matter thorough study. I will report more fully at a later date on this particular issue facing the legislature.

Vice President Nixon will address the joint assembly in Salem on Feb. 14 which is the anniversary of the State of Oregon as well as the anniversary of Remé and myself! A large celebration is contemplated, including a mammoth ball. I was appointed on a committee of four from the legislature to make arrangements for the Nixon visit.

Well, that will be all for this week—but I do want to accent once more my sincerity when I ask you to let me know of any questions or comments you may have concerning the legislature and the matters which we are discussing here in Salem.

A joint meeting of Senate and House members on Saturday before the official opening of the legislative session was devoted to hearing Dr. Sly's report on taxation.

Due to Sunday caucuses, which took care of all preliminary work, the organization on Monday went off like clock work. The representatives were sworn in by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, with the oath administered to the whole group at the same time. This was followed by the election of House officers.

They were: Speaker, Chief Clerk, Assistant Chief Clerk, Journal clerk, Calendar clerk and Sergeant-at-arms.

An interesting sidelight in the committee announcements was the selection of several Republicans as chairmen of important committees. I was fortunate in

being assigned to committees on Agriculture and Livestock, Alcoholic Control and Commerce and Utilities.

The inaugural ceremonies were very interesting. Many state notables were present, including four ex-governors, the Supreme Court members, and other state officials, Gov. Robert Holmes and Gov.-elect Mark Hatfield.

When the escort committees had seated everybody in their proper places you wondered how they would ever get them out in an orderly manner because it seemed as if every available inch of space on the House floor and in the galleries was occupied.

The addresses of both retiring Gov. Holmes and newly-elected Gov. Hatfield contained plenty of food for thought. Gov. Hatfield cited the austerity of the pioneers as an example of emulation in the years ahead. It seemed to me that the keynote of his address was, "Is it essential to the well-being of our state? If not, can we afford it?"

There was a reception in the governor's suite in the capitol immediately following the inaugural ceremonies and another from 7 to 9 p.m. Monday.

The waiting line at both times reminded me of those at Boise when we used to attend Community Concerts there. We gave up in the afternoon but came back in the evening.

We live in a sort of legislator's colony about a mile and a half out on Portland Road.
