Public welfare payments in General Assistance alone totaled \$7,186.37 in Malheur county in penditures in all welfare commission categories throughout the county in December totaled \$38,or 8.5 percent, over November.

The county commission granted financial assistance to 415 eligible recipients in December and an additional 63 cases received social service but no money payment. This represented a total increase of 46 cases over November, with all of the increase falling into the categories of General Assistance and Child Welfare serv-

The commission said the number of persons receiving Old Age assistance and Aid to the Disabled decreased slightly from the
