YOUR LEGISLATORS SPEAK . . .

Since the Supreme Court has finally ruled that Gov. Hatfield is legally the governor of our state and that Howell Appling is the duly and properly appointed secretary of state, we can now perhaps concentrate on legislative matters.

It is unfortunate that some people were so overwhelmed by a desire to place a stumbling block in the path of Gov. Hatfield that they persuaded a well-intentioned retired public servant to serve as the goat in the farcical production.

The dispute concerning the legality of the new secretary of state's position was one invented by a few manipulators. Actually this effort to embarrass the incoming governor had some ill effects. Not only did it cost a substantial amount of money to the state, but in addition, there were certain state employees and eligible recipients of welfare and unemployment funds whose sustenance was threatened by reason of the secretary of state dispute.

The unanimous decision of the court very clearly refuted each and every single contention of the attorney general and perhaps most embarrassing was the fact that the Supreme Court cited Oregon cases to support its position.

Major Problems Cited
The major problems which will confront this session concern expenditures, taxation and unemployment compensation. At this time, I will merely touch on these subjects as they apply to us here and to the people of Oregon, and in the future will specifically discuss various issues that may affect our county.

The General Fund Budget for the 1959-61 biennium is expected to be \$300 million. This has been designated as an "austerity" budget. However, in my judgment, this amount is sufficient to maintain the level of state services without increasing income taxes.

When you bear in mind that the budget for the past biennium was about \$270 million, the \$30 million increase seems adequate. There are those who insist that additional expenditures should be made. In fact, it is my impression that the various pressure groups in and about the lobbies are perhaps more insistent than ever.

There has been a bill introduced to increase basic school support to \$120 per child. Furthermore, representatives of one of the educational associations are demanding that basic school support be increased to \$140 per child. To accomplish either one of these objectives would require a corresponding increase in our income taxes. A \$10 million increase has been requested for salaries of state employees. The state police budget will apparently be increased by approximately \$1 million. Public welfare requests will undoubtedly increase. These are merely a few examples of the increased expenditures that are being requested. There are many more.

Should Evaluate Requests
I think the proper test to be applied in evaluating a request for increased expenditures is the guide submitted by the governor in his inaugural address. He stated:

"These specific common sense features are the big reasons why Ford is the best seller:
1 Six passengers, not just four, ride in comfort. Yes, even the man in the middle, because Ford's full-depth seats are extra thick all the way across.
2 The doors are wider for easier entry. Compared with Ford's major competitor, they open wider . . . and have convenient two-stage front door checks.
3 Ford's styling is sensible. It's clean and simple like the Thunderbird. No useless frills or wings that are easy to dent.
4 Ford's frame surrounds you with safety. In its field, only Ford has a wide-base frame that seats all passengers within the protection of its husky side rails.
5 Ford's spacious luggage compartment is easier to load and unload. High rear trunk wall on Ford's nearest competitor makes loading and unloading difficult.
6 Ford's got the most sound and weather insulation. The most everywhere. No other low-priced car compares.
7 Ford is economical. You save up to a dollar a tankful with standard Six or Thunderbird V-8 engines that thrive on regular gas. You need change oil only after each 4000 miles. And the muffler is aluminized to last twice as long as ever."

Actually, this has resulted from laws which exist upon our statutes. Requests have now been made upon us to tighten the loopholes so that the law may be restored to its original intent. On the other hand, there are those who desire even a broader and more generous application of the law. The question as to where we will end at this session will depend upon the legislature and their willingness to analyze the unemployment problem in its true scope. It is certain that action must be taken to increase the basic fund to a point where recessions will not deplete it. On the other hand, some formula should be adopted whereby the contribution by the employers will not be seriously reduced during periods of prosperity, and suddenly and rapidly increased during recession. It occurs to me that the hills and valleys should be eliminated, if possible.

A group of legislators from Olympia, Wash., were here yesterday. It was interesting having lunch with them and observing their reactions to the proceedings in our Senate Taxation committee of which I am a member. Washington apparently has far more serious problems than Oregon, because they are staring a \$100 million deficit in the face rather than a \$32 million surplus as is the case in Oregon.

Parman Fined \$125 In Municipal Court

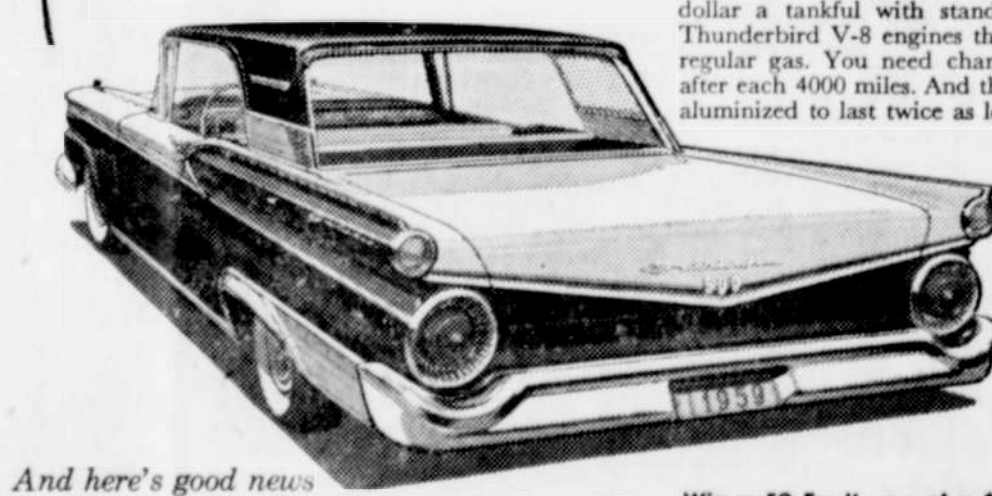


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
