

## Antelopes Down Pilgrims 60 to 55, Tounce Wilder 85 to 57; Now Boast SRV-B First Place with 9-0 Record

Adrian's winning Antelopes held tightly on to first place in the SRV-B basketball league last weekend by easing by New Plymouth 60 to 55 and trouncing Wilder 85 to 57 as they ran their league record to nine won and none lost.

Friday night at New Plymouth the Pilgrims nearly held their own for the first quarter as the Antelopes led only 18 to 17. In the second period

Adrian cut loose and by the time the half ended they had run their lead up to 42 to 23.

The Antelopes held onto their lead easily throughout the third period as it ended 53 to 41. In the final period, with only Antelope substitutes playing, New Plymouth nearly closed the gap and the final buzzer sounded with the Antelopes leading 60 to 55.

### Free Throw Average High

Overall, Adrian's hitting average on field goals dropped from previous performances as they hit only 17 of 56 attempts for a 30 percent average. Their free throws held up, however, when they sank 72 percent, dropping in 26 of 36 attempts.

Antelope Fred Sayre easily led the evening's scoring with a big 27 points. Other Adrian scoring included Mike Sillonis with 13, Jim Thompson 7, Phil Hatch 6, Kay Cleverly 5, and Gary Neilson and Rex Langley each with 1.

The story was about the same Saturday night when the Antelopes, playing at home, met Wilder, except they maintained their margin throughout the game.

### Lead Throughout Game

The Antelopes had a 8-point lead by the end of the first quarter with the score at 24-16 and they continued to add to this, ending the first half 49 to 30. Adrian held on to the same margin during the third period and led 64 to 45 when it ended, but they added another nine points to their lead before the game ended 85 to 57.

### Field Goals Improve

Adrian's shooting average improved on field goals from the night before, but their completion of free throws dropped a little. The Antelopes sank 35 of 67 field goal attempts for a 53 percent. At the free throw line they hit only 13 of 21 charity shots for 60 percent.

Individual Adrian scoring was high with Sayre's 30 points leading the list. Cleverly had 17 points, Sillonis 16, Hatch 14, and Langley and Thompson each 4.

Tomorrow night the Antelopes travel to Fruitland for a near-crucial league game with the second-place Grizzlies. Fruitland has a 7 won, 2 lost league record. Saturday night the Antelopes return home to meet Marsing.

## Bulldogs Down Payette 56 to 43 Friday But Lose to Vale 38 to 30; Parma, Ontario Here This Weekend

Nyssa's Bulldogs overcame Payette's good ball handling Friday night to down the Idaho squad 56 to 43 but, even though they held them to only two field goals in the entire second half, Vale edged Nyssa out 38 to 30 Saturday night.

Friday night on their home floor the Bulldogs trailed Payette 9 to 10 at the end of the first quarter and, in the face of the Idahoans outstanding handling of the ball, managed to jump ahead only 23 to 21 by the time the half ended.

It was a different story in the third period, however, as the Bulldogs ran up 21 points while Payette could manage only 8. This widened Nyssa's lead to 44-29. Payette outscored the Bulldogs by 2-points in the final quarter of play, but this was 13 short of closing the gap as the contest ended 56 to 43.

### Meyers-Myrick High Men

Bulldogs—Jack Meyers and Jerry Myrick led Friday night's scoring with 14 points each. Other Bulldog scoring included Ron Rookstool with 9, Dave Sewright 8, Gary Toomb 5, and Clark Jacques, Burton Smith and Knute Stoneberg each with 2.

Saturday night in Vale the Bulldogs started their games with a severe case of Viking-itis and managed to squeeze out only 4 points in the first quarter while Vale totaled 11. In the second period Nyssa managed 8 more points while the Vikings made 9 to end the half 20 to 12.

### Vale Held on Field Goals

Things were different in the second half, though, as the Bulldogs held Vale to only two field goals for the rest of the game.

But called fouls proved to be Nyssa's downfall as Vale made 14 points in the final half on free throws, even though the Bulldogs out-rebounded and shot them.

The Bulldogs were trailing only 20 to 25 by the end of the third period and when the game ended they were still behind 8-points, 38 to 30.

### Two Tough Games Due

Meyers and Sewright's 6 points each were enough to lead Bulldog scoring for the evening, as Myrick had 5, Smith and Toomb had 4 each, Jacques 3, and LeRoy Morris and Rookstool each had 1.

The Bulldogs will play their first and only two-game, weekend stand on the Nyssa floor this season when they meet Parma here tomorrow night and Ontario here Saturday night. Nyssa has suffered defeats from both squads in earlier contests.

## Commission Sets April 25 to Oct. 31 Fishing Season

A complete closure on the Columbia river and tributary streams to salmon angling during the month of November, an extended winter steelhead season on the Nestucca, and an early trout opener for the upper Rogue and North Umpqua rivers highlighted the game commission meeting in Portland on Friday where the final angling rules for 1959 were established. Only a few minor changes were made in the tentative rules proposed two weeks ago, which set the angling season from April 25 to Oct. 31.

The November closure on the Columbia and tributaries prohibits the taking of salmon and jack salmon during the entire month of November. The commission said they felt the closure was justified in view of the low stocks of fall races of salmon that enter the Columbia system during the November period.

In the main, the closure would affect remnant runs of silver salmon that move into the Columbia tributaries. The most important of these rivers include the Willamette and its tributaries and the Sandy river.

No changes were made from last year's regulations for Malheur county. However, under the new rules, Dolly Varden trout will be included in the regular trout bag limit.

The commission has proposed that trout season not open until May 30 in all coastal zones to allow a greater escapement of downstream migrant salmon and steelhead "youngsters."

Lakes, reservoirs, and their tributaries within national forest boundaries in the Cascades would also open on May 30 and extend through Oct. 18. An exception will be made at East and Paulina lakes which will close on Oct. 3.

Added restrictions were placed on salmon anglers fishing in ocean waters which would prohibit them from keeping feeder salmon under 20 inches in length. The rule would apply from Tillamook head to the California line. The 22-inch salmon rule was retained for the Columbia river to Tillamook head.

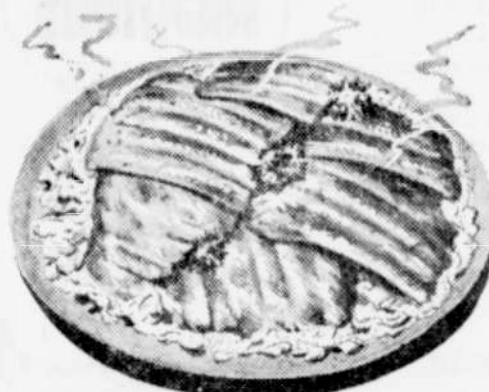

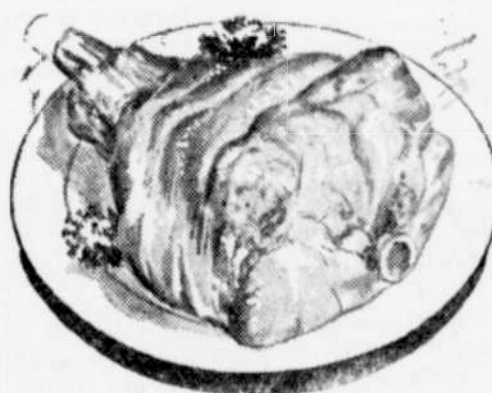
