Nysson Relates Varied Experiences While Studying Spanish in Mexico

Some enjoy the convenience of a car here in Mexico but I prefer the experiences one encounters on the buses and streetcars.

Nearly two months ago, Bishop Leipzig sent Father Kirkpatrick and me to Mexico to study Spanish so that our pastoral work in Eastern Oregon might be more effective among the Spanish speaking residents and the migrant workers.

My Spanish classes are at the Instituto Mexicano Norteamericano de Relaciones Culturales in 115 Hamburg street in Mexico City. There I attend classes from 5 to 8 p.m. daily. The Instituto is ten miles from our residence. Every day at 3 p.m. I catch a bus and begin my hour and a half ride to school. Our course is what they term Intensive Spanish; we try to cram a six month's college course of Spanish into three weeks. I completed Course One in December and verify that it is "Intensive" and yesterday I started Course Two which they assure me is more difficult.

Where could one see so much in such a short time as one views taking place in the bus or streetcar. My bus takes me to Villa Obregon of St. Angel and from there I transfer to a streetcar for downtown Mexico.

The bus rides cost only 20 centavos or two pennies in U.S. coin; the remaining five miles on the streetcar costs 25 centavos. Today on my way to class I jotted down some of the impressions and sights on the bus.

One would have to travel far to gather together such a varied group. The bus seats 30 passengers but there were fifty of us aboard. Among them were a Catholic priest, two Sisters, two soldiers; a carpenter and a plumber carrying the tools of their trade; a woman with an earthen jar containing a hot lunch; a man with a bicycle and another carrying a large banjo; there were children with dirty faces; some mothers carried babies in their arms, others had their arms full of groceries; there were students with their books; some carried suitcases; one little girl clutched a small bouquet of tiny flowers. Two young boys boarded the bus with large wicker baskets that were at least 24-inches in diameter. Some of the passengers were well dressed in suit and tie, others wore the clothing of the poor. I suppose one sees people at their best and again some acting thoughtlessly. It does not bring a smile to notice a young boy in greasy overalls trying to squeeze a seat next to a well-dressed lady. But it warms the heart to watch a young father board the streetcar with a live chicken and a bottle of pop in one arm and the other hand clasping the hand of a tiny daughter. One of the lady passengers noticed his plight and picked up the little girl and held her

in her lap. Even though the lady was a total stranger, the small girl seemed to sense her thoughtfulness and sat contentedly on her lap.

Another amazing sight is to notice how easily some of the passengers can doze off to sleep. How they know when they reach their destination is beyond me.

A great advantage in traveling by public conveyance is the opportunity to listen to the conversations of the passengers. Thus one can pick out familiar words and phrases that have been taught him in class. Parents are thoughtful in teaching Spanish to their tiny youngsters as they ride along. Even though they may not have the advantage of a formal education, still their diction is clear and our professors tell us that they speak grammatically correct.

So while some wear themselves out driving in Mexico (and one must see the open-field tactics of the drivers to appreciate it), I'll leave the driving to others and sit back and study Spanish or enjoy life as it surrounds me on the public conveyances.
