Catholic Priest Continues Report On Mexico Visit

Editor's Note: Father John Baumgartner, pastor of St. Bridget's Catholic church in Nyssa, is studying Spanish in Mexico for part of his church's pastoral work in Eastern Oregon. A detailed account last week told of the classes as well as his experiences with the people of that country.

The other day four of us, three students of the Seminario De Misiones and I, went out for a walk. It was a cloudy afternoon and a bit on the chilly side so we stopped at one of the wayside cafes along Insurgentes Avenue, a four lane highway for North and South traffic, for a cup of coffee.

The small restaurant was typical of many that are found every few hundred yards along the highway. There is a table for those who wish to sit while they eat or drink; then there is a counter along which most seem to prefer to stand while they munch a sandwich or drink their coffee or "frescos."

Those in Mexico who know how to speak English are always looking for an opportunity to practice it lest they grow stale in its use. It turned out that the owner of the restaurant was a Mexican married to a Korean lady, who had lived most of her life in Mexico but was educated in American schools. What I feared might be one of those aimless conversations in English, turned out to be a most interesting one.

It was the wife who spoke English and she had a colorful history. Her grandfather had been minister of war in Korea but had come to Mexico when the Japanese first entered Korea. Her father was the first cousin of Sygman Rhee. Although she was Korean by background and blood, still she felt she was representative of Mexico because she had lived most of her life in that country.

When the coffee was served, I asked how much it cost. I was told to drink it first and see if it was good. Then after finishing the coffee, we launched into another conversation. There was no charge for the coffee. They were only too glad to return a favor to an American. It didn't matter who, just so they could show an American that Mexicans were grateful to the Americans for what they did at Tampico when the typhoon struck in Tampico in the State of Tamaulipas, many people were killed, others were stranded without food and shelter. The Americans came and brought these necessities and did so even at the peril of their lives. Then the lady went on to tell me that when the Government asked what was the cost, they were told there was no charge. This had made a great impression on the Mexicans and the lady felt that she was typical of the rest of the Mexicans in her feelings. Previously, there had been some resentment towards their neighbors to the North; but this incident had done much to erase that feeling.

Within the near future he said a number of Oregon herds will be recorded on IBM machines and even though there will be some changes in the type of record kept he explained the possibility of a more accurate and simple record with this method.
