Homespun America, which is edited by Wallace Brockway, contains a collection of writings which are happy, somber, gay, serious, rough, subtle, and otherwise designed to capture the essential quality of the free United States.

In Clear and Present Danger by John W. Cauley, the author submits that while no one can be indifferent to our national security, all citizens should be aware of the curtailment of our "marginal liberties"—freedom of religion, of speech and assembly, of the press, the freedom of the individual against arbitrary duress, and of the freedoms contained in the guarantees of due process. An earnest and knowledgeable report traces the expedient security measures of the post-World War II years, the entrenchment of McCarthyism, and the ensuing trials and legislation and sounds a warning against both complacency and hysteria.

Boy On The Rooftop by Tamas Szabo is an authentic account of the Budapest revolt by a 15-year-old freedom fighter.

Walter The Improbable Hound by Fred Ayer tells how life at the Ayer household revolves around an improbable basset hound. The long-suffering author records Walter's exploits in far-flung yards and homes as well as domestic adventures.

The Cerebral-Palsied Child by Winthrop M. Philips is a guide for parents of those afflicted.
