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Christian Church Hosts Missionary From Thailand

John R. Sams, Christian church missionary to Thailand, will speak at the Christian church Monday, Feb. 23, at 8:00 p.m. A potluck dinner at 6:30 will precede his talk. Mr. Sams has done administrative work and evangelism and has been stationed at Nakon Pathom, Thailand. He first went to Thailand in 1954.

Mr. Sams directed and participated in a series of eight survey sorties into a rugged jungle area 200 or more miles northwest of Nakon Pathom, by jeep, power boat, by elephant, and on foot. Favorable reports were brought back regarding the interest of the residents of the area in receiving Christian missionaries and accepting the Christian faith. As a result missionary couples are being assigned to medical, educational and evangelistic work among these people.

A native of Whatcheer, Iowa, Mr. Sams received the BS degree in 1949 at Iowa State College. He was granted the master of religious education degree in 1952 at the Divinity school of Drake University in Des Moines. He also studied at Kennedy School of Missions, Hartford, Conn., and was ordained in 1952 at the Central Christian church, Marshalltown, Iowa.
